Thus, with this all embracing and comprehensive vision that the Marathwada Shikshan Prasarak Mandal saw an hour of dawn in Sept. 1958. The founding fathers of institution were the towering personalities and hence they had thought to start colleges in an ignored area to achieve the intended goals and objectives, also for social transformation through education.

In June 1960 that these views were came to renown and implemented, with the inauguration of Balbhim Arts, Science and Commerce College, Beed and Deogiri College at Aurangabad with the auspicious hands of Hon'ble Shri Y.B.Chavan, the then Chief Minister of Maharashtra. It was prosperous start made to achieve the esteemed goals and objectives. The Mandal also established one more college at Parbhani in 1961. The Mandal could thus uplifted people of Beed district, who had been deprived of, by the educational centre with the positive efforts which raised to Balbhim Arts, Science and Commerce College here in Beed. - The library is the heart of college, despite the more away from print and towards electronic resources. The library undertakes and contributes directly to the institution's/college's academic mission and to equipping students with the skills & knowledge fulfil the need to achieve academically and to maximize their employability. The college library is fully automated with DELNET software. At present in includes total 92,604 books and world wide accepted journals around 93 journals of maximum subjects. Executive Summary and SWOC Analysis

- ➤ It is a matter of great pleasure to submit the self study report (SSR) for third cycle. It has also given an opportunity for us to review the progress done by our college after second accreditation.
- ➤ M.S.P Mandal's Balbhim Arts, Science and Commerce college is affiliated to Dr.Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada university, Aurangabad. The curriculum admission and evaluation processes are as per the rules and regulations prescribed by the affiliated University , government of Maharashtra and UGC
- ➤ Principal and director of P.G. Education are acting as a member on the management council of the University our faculty participate in a process of syllabus revision as a member of board of studies or as a member of subcommittee University, BOS member and expents from the society(Industry, Institute etc) Collectively work for the preparation of syllabi. University and Balbhim College organized workshops on university curriculum and make their implementation. College has organized **Three** work shops on syllabus revision.
- ➤ The institution offers **Six** UG programmes i.e B A with **Seventeen** Subject,B.COM(General) and B.SC with **Nine** Subject B.CA(Science) and BCA (Management). **Eight** P.G. in Arts facults **One** PG in Commerce and **Five** PG inscience. **Three** UGC Sponsored career oriented programme and **Three** course in human right education at UG and PG level. Courses under EPOC Study centre i.e Gandhian Study Centre and Vivekanand study centre Sanctioned under UGC in XI Plan and got continuation in XII Plan
- After second accreditation, college has introduced **Three** PG courses in science and **One** course in Arts.
- ➤ Semester system is followed at UG level and from the academic year 2015-2016 CBC Grading system has been introduced in all P.G Programmes.
- ➤ A wide range of subject Combination is offered to the students. At UG level in Arts Science and Commerce the Student has to select three optional subject from the subject Combinations given by the University. English is compulsory at first and second year level and second languages subject has to be elected by the students.
- There are **Five** group combinations in arts and **Fifteen** group combinations in science that are made available to the student. The College provide a strong support to the faculty for effective curriculum delivery. A well equipped Language Lab, ICT Classroom, enriched library with a support of Guest Lectures, Invitee talk, student seminar, Industrial and educational excursions act as a part of academic activity.
- The university Grant Commission New Delhi has awarded a status of "college with Potential for Excellence" (CPE Status) in XI plan and on the basis of performanc in implementing the schemes and Utilization of

- UGC funds the college got continuation in the second phase of **CPE** in **XII** plan. Similarly UGC has granted BSR Scheme for the enrichment of science Department. The status and the scheme sanctioned by UGC helped the college to enrich their source in making still better academic and administrative Governance and activates.
- ➤ Record of teaching activity is monitored by HOD and Principal through daily teaching plan dairy Maintained by the teachers.
- A separate P.G. Director is appointed for observing and monitoring of PG teaching A short term research projects are also given to the P.G. Students through BSR Scheme. Time table committee make a central time table of the college. The individual department prepare their time table and it is distributed among the faculties of the dept.
- ➤ Remedial coaching classes are conducted for slow learnes.
- ➤ A Mechanism to take feedback from the students on curriculum is practiced.

II Teaching Learning and Evaluation

- ➤ The College has a well qualified teaching staff satisfying the educational need of the students is the prime objective of the college which is performed by the faculty. It is done by keeping pace with the mission and vision of the college and also considering the social and economical back ground of students.
- The college has experienced and Qualified staff in which Sixteen arewith NET/SET Qualifications and Five are with M.phill Degree. Twenty Staff members Are with doctorate degree. The college encourage them in updating their knowledge by permitting them to attend conferences seminar, workshop refresher courses, short term courses etc. In the beginning of the academic year, wide publicity is given about the admission programme through prospect; of the college, New paper, college website(www.mspmbeed.com) and Electronic media and display on college notice board. On Line admission facility is available that achieve transparency in the admission. Eligibility criteria, reservation is strictly followed as per the rules and regulations framed by the affiliated University and State Government.
- ➤ The College has Constituted the admission committee That work in morning and afternoon sessions admission committee provides proper counseling to every student who approach for admission necessary attention is given to student in selecting the subjects required help is given to socially and physically challenged students. After a specific period a Student can change his subject if he desires so with the permission of Principal. The college take periodic review of admission process and take care to complete the process before stipulated date given by the University.
- ➤ Once the admission process is over the concerned teacher adopt different methods of teaching. The slow and advanced learners are identified. Slow learners are trained through remedial coaching and advanced learners are encouraged to take part in seminars projects etc.
- ➤ Facilities like library, internet, well equipped laboratories, computer, ICT tools, are provided to the student in order to make the learning more

- student-centric, Students are exposed to advanced level by arranging lectures of eminent persons.
- > State level science exhibition and state level science talent search examination are the two prominent events organized by the college in grooming the student and sharpening their skill.
- ➤ IQAC plan the teaching and learning activity and monitor its implementation during current academic year.
- ➤ Proper care is taken by the faculty to avoid a risk of dropout of students by counseling and providing financial assistance in some cases help to decrease the dropout.
- **Earn and Learn' scheme** is run by the college for needy students.
- ➤ Different course sanctioned by **UGC** under merged scheme, human right education career oriented programme, study centres are run simultaneously for the benefit of the student. A co-ordinater for each course is appointed who take care about the proper implementation of the courses.
- ➤ Within the framework of the affiliating University the evaluation process is done. The teacher conduct class test, tutorials, Question answer and problem solving sessions, student seminars, short term project and college internal examination. Examinations committee framed by the college look after to conduct internal as well as university examinations.
- ➤ The students showing excellence in academic and other co-curricular and extra curricular activities are awarded with Balbhim Puraskar' and felicitated in annual social gathering every year.
- ➤ Internal assessment system has been eliminated by the University from 2013-2014. Presently University semester exam is of 50 Mark.
- ➤ Assessment of answer book is done by expect teacher.
- ➤ University has awarded our college for 'Ideal examination centre award' in 2010.
- At college level the answer books are shown to the student. If he feels some query he can approach to the concern teachers and the teacher look after to this matter and satisfy his query.
- As per guidelines given by the University he can apply for verification of marks by obtaining a photo copy of the answer book.

III Criteria: Research Consultancy and Extension

After second accreditation, Balbhim College has made constant efforts towards further promotion of research ,extension and consultancy

- ➤ College has designed a **research promotion committee** (**R.P.C**) that monitor the research activities. The procedural support to the concerned student and faculty is provided by the committee M.S.P.Mandal and college also organize seminar and workshops on research for the benefit of the faculty. All necessary facilities in respect for library laboratory, instrumentation and internet facility is provided to the teachers. The research activity is also monitored by Principal and IQAC.
- ➤ Two research journal with ISSN number are published by the college. The journal published in science entitled, The Journal of basic and applied Science having ISSN No. 2229-3302 and that published under social science and languages and commerce is Abhisaran having ISSN No. 2229-

- **4858** Eminent personalities from the academic and research field are working on the editorial board of the Journals.
- A special seminar devoted to research only for students doing research was organized by the department of Commerce. The total organization of seminar was done by the students only.
- ➤ out of **Nineteen** minor project, sanctioned by UGC, **Seventeen** minor projects have been successfully completed and **Two** projects are ongoing. Total **Six** major Research projects are sanctioned by UGC out of which **Two** major projects are completed and **Four** major research projects are ongoing. The College also provide research project grant to the students through UGC-BSR scheme. The projects are carried out by student under guidance of teacher. Eighty Four Projects are completed by the student under UGC-BSR scheme.

- ➤ The publications in the research journal has obtained **One Hundred and Thirty Eight** citations.
- **>** Books written by the faculty are **Thirty One**.
- ➤ College has organized **Twenty Two** seminars and workshops to keep and increase the research interest of the faculty. Faculty has felicitated With **Gold Medal** for making best paper presentation In the seminar.
- ➤ Collaboration link and mou has been established by some department that help them while doing research and in completing their major and minor Research project.
- ➤ Consultancy is provided to the stakeholders by the department of Microbiology, commerce, psychology, Agrochemical and fertilizer, Botany and Zoology. The consultancy is given in the area of Agriculture as it is the main occupation of Beed district. Department of Zoology has developed a unit of 'Vermicompost' and Aquarum maintainence. Depart of Agrochemical and fertilizer consult in the area of soil and water analysis and fertilizer Recommendation. The consultancy to the farmers in the area of organic farming and plant disease diagnosis are given by the department of Botany, psychology department provide service in hospital and Counselling to the student particularly those who are suffering from depression. Microbiology department make consultancy in food adulteration commerce department provided advice in tax planning to the stake holders. All consultancies are free of cost.
- Extension activities are carried out by every department and also by the support services as NCC, NSS, Sports cultural section and study centres sanctioned by UGC for the benefit of the stakeholders. The activities conducted are in different categories as boold donation, tree plantation, environmental awareness, road safety, traffic control, health ,Scientific temper, street play etc.

➤ Different extension activities carried out at 'Kakadhira' a village adopted by the college as a programme under community development.

IV Criteria: Infrastructure And Learning Resources

College has adequate physical infrastructure for efficient implementation of academic activities. The total area of the college is 7566 sq.m.

- ➤ UPS System for continuous electric supply to departments, Administrative office, Library has been provided. There are- **Two** generators of 30 and 25 KV available in the campus.
- ➤ Placement Cell, counseling cell, health centre, NCC, NSS, are provided with an independent space. The Placement cell has a Co-ordinater.
- ➤ The Library of the college has a collection of fifty six thousand two hundred and eighty five Text Book , Thirty seven Thousand five hundred twenty four Reference Book , Ninenty Three Journals and periodicals, Eighty Thousand Four Hundred and Nine E-book and Three Thousand Eight Hundred Twenty Eight E-journals. The library is fully computerized with barcoding , and has a provision of INFLIBNET. The internet facility is available in the library.

- Under this course the college runs diploma and certificate course on Swami Vivekananda. As an outcome of this many students completed diploma and certificate course from this center.
- National integration has developed in the student.

Human Rights Education:

To create human rights awareness in the peoples of society and students of the college, we are running three (diploma & certificate) Human rights courses.

- To percolate human rights education in the students we have conducted lectures on the designed curriculum and taken an examination on that.
- Coordinator of this center along with students, visited to nearby villages and gave information regarding human rights. As a result, many students have completed diploma and certificate courses and human rights awareness is created among the students.

Equal Opportunity Center:

To create awareness about equality and social justice, equal opportunity Centre was established as per the guidelines of U.G.C. in the college.

❖ <u>Vivekwahini:</u>

Vivekwahini is established in college to create awareness about superstition among the students.

& Earn and Learn Scheme:

For economically weaker section students, college provides the facility of "Earn and Learn" scheme through Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad.

❖ Village Survey:

As a part of social activities we adopted a village Kakadhira 4 km away from the Beed and done economical, social, cultural, male and female ratio, educational survey of this village. After this we have analyzed the data and written it in the form of a book named 'Kondanatil Hira" and distributed these books among the peoples of the village.

Rationale:

To increase the ratio of higher education in the society, the central government implemented some policies. In regard of this the institute adopted these policies and decided to commence one UG programme in Psychology and three PG programmes in Physics, Botany and Mathematics

Physics:

Former president of India late Dr.A.P.J.Abdul Kalam had seen dream of 20-20, in order to go towards this Physics has to play important role in the development of technology. But at the same time in the last five years the students have not gone towards the Engineering due to less job opportunities,

as a result student coming towards the basic sciences are increasing, particularly in Physics which has wide scope in teaching and research particularly in Astrophysics, Nanotechnology, Aeronautics, Electronics etc.

Keeping this in mind our institution has decided to start post graduation in Physics.

Another reason to start post graduation in Physics is that our college is situated at district place and there is no P.G. in Physics throughout the district to fulfil the need of graduate student in this area we have started post graduation in physics.

Botany:

Our college is situated nearby the queue of Balaghat where most of the bio-diversity is found in medicinal plants. Beside this most of the people are engaged in agricultural practices such as Horticulture, floriculture etc. But in this region of such bio-diversity we found very few colleges having post graduation in Botany. Every year, thousands of students get graduation in Botany. But due to socio-economical barriers they can't go outside to get a post graduate education. To avail the facility of higher education and as per recommendation (oral) of previous NAAC pear team college decided to start P.G. Course in Botany. The step is also taken to inculcate research culture among the students.

Mathematics:

As all of us know that Mathematics is the queen of all sciences and has a wide range of applications in various branches of sciences and in other applied fields. Day by day the strength of students having graduation in Mathematics subject is increasing which results in increase of demand for post graduation in Mathematics. Beed district has 52 senior colleges out of which only 2 college has a post - graduate department of Mathematics. As a result the demand of students for post-graduation is increased. So our institute decided to start post graduation department in our college.

Moreover, under the "Sarva Shikshan Abhiyan" of government strength of school students are increasing which results in an increase of demand of Mathematics teacher in schools and colleges.

To provide human resource the post-graduation in Mathematics is the need of society. For this reason our institute started M.Sc. (Mathematics) course from academic year 2012-2013.

Psychology:

Now a days Psychology counselor has more importance to counsel farmers which are going to commit suicide, people who are in depression due to overload of work, family problems, unnecessary competition etc. Government has also decided to create a post of Psychology Counselor for the students in each school and colleges to remove stress of students. Keeping this view in mind our institution has started Psychology at B.A. level.

CRITERION II: TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

2.1 Student Enrollment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

Balbhim College has established in **1960**. At that time, there was no any college for higher education in this area. The college establishment aim is the students come from the economically weaker section and depressed classes also them enable to join the main stream of education as well as increases the enrollment of students.

Balbhim College is one of the reputed and oldest colleges in "Marathwada" region which has been working in higher education since 1960. The college is providing quality education facilities to the students seeking for higher education, therefore college has great *publicity*. It attracts students from all over the state and it shown by significant increase in the student enrollment since last reaccreditation.

Publicity in the Admission Process

- ➤ The college ensures publicity and transparency in admission process.
- ➤ The detail information regarding admission criteria, programmes offered, endowments, fee structure, scholarships, free-ships, hostel accommodation, the detailed syllabic and other student support facilities are provided in the college prospectus.
- The complete admission process, admission policy, schedule of form submission and fee structure are displayed on the college website, in the prospectus as well as on the notice-boards in the administration building, at prominent locations in the campus and updated from time to time.
- ➤ Information regarding entrance examination for PG courses is displayed on the college website as well as on the notice-boards.
- ➤ Our Students and our Alumni give great publicity to our college.
- ➤ Our Alumni have been sending their children to our college on account of the Brand Value. The college takes some extra efforts for publicity and transparency in admission process in the following manner:
- ➤ Large numbers of college news and advertisements are regularly publishing in prominent Newspapers.
- > By Local Cable Network (on Beed Darshan)
- > Through Facebook and Whatsapp group.
- > By Exhibiting Flexes and Banners
- > Through Parents and Alumni meetings
- ➤ The Staff and Alumni also pass on the information to the aspirants.
- ➤ By exhibiting wall-posters on the notice boards of Private University centers (like Y.C.M.U. and IGNOU).
- > By Distribution of pamphlets
- > By Presentation of video clip / PPt presentations on occasion of "*Open day*" in college.

- Achievement of students of various courses is displayed on the notice board of departments and also published news in the newspapers.
- Direct inquiries by prospective candidates or parents through phone calls, emails and personal visits during the academic year are managed diligently and systematically by the office.

Transparency in the process:

- Application forms reach out to a wider section of the society.
- Applicant can apply from anywhere by online process. The direct benefits of the online system are *transparent* in the whole process.
- ➤ Applicant can also apply by offline process.
- ➤ Under supervision of the principal, *offline process* is controlled by "Admission Committee" to maintain *transparency* in the entire process.
- ➤ The College appoints "Admission Committee" contain Faculty members, Student welfare officer and supporting staff.
- ➤ The students are provided Permanent Registration Number (PRN) for further use.
- ➤ The lists of students admitted to various courses are displayed on the notice board and the same is submitted to Dr. B. A. M. University website for approval.
- ➤ By using this process, we reduced long queues, reduced paperwork, reduction of human involvement, and go beyond geographical boundaries.
- ➤ These efforts made the admission process more accurate, reliable and user friendly.
- 2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the Institution.

We try to empower students coming from the rural community by admitting them at minimum eligibility conditions for UG courses; because our aim is to admit students of different backgrounds and abilities.

Admission Criterion:

a) For UG Courses:

- > Students are admitted according to the Dr. B. A. M. University.
- ➤ However, For UG admission criteria basis is adopted on first come first basis.
- Eligible students are not denied admissions if the seats are vacant.
- ➤ College also give admission opportunity to the student has excelled in sports and cultural activities.

b) For PG Courses:

- > Entrance examinations are conducted for all PG Programmes in Science
- ➤ In case of PG admission Programmes, merit list is prepared by considering 50% of entrance marks and 50% marks of that particular subject at the UG level.
- ➤ For admission to PG programme in Arts and Commerce streams gives 100% weightage for percentage scored at UG level of that particular subject.

c) Reservation Criteria:

In admission process *reservation* are given as per rules and regulations of the State government and University, received from time to time.

The process of admission:

- ➤ The college follows offline as well as an online admission process which are transparent.
- ➤ The offline process controlled by Admission Committee working under supervision of the principal.
- ➤ Invite applications for every programme.
- ➤ The admission process is working through computerized automation system. Through which students are provided Permanent Registration Number (PRN) for further use.
- ➤ Necessary documents like eligibility certificate, migration certificate, E.B.C. forms, etc. are collected.
- ➤ Applications scrutinized by admission committee.
- All admissions are given on a provisional basis, it subject to verification of documents by IOAC and eligibility from university.
- Admission is conformed after approval given by Dr. B. A. M. University and the list of the students admitted is displayed on notice boards.
- > The Principal reserves the rights of final admission and can cancel admission any time after verification.
- ➤ Identity Card cum library card is issued as soon as after admission process was completed.

- ➤ After analysis of the students' profiles Admission Committee displayed the students name list on the notice board, those required to submit their incomplete document in given time period.
- ➤ After review of admission process and student profile some *Observation*, *Opinion* and *Suggestions* made by this committee for improvement in the current admission process. In the last few years action taken by the college to improve the process as given bellow:



For SC / ST / NT/ OBC categories:-


- > Scholarships are procured for them to ease their financial constraints.

For Women:-

- > 50 % of the available seats are reserved for women students.
- ➤ A healthy and optimistic atmosphere for students and especially for the girl students are provided on campus.
- > Separate Ladies staff room and girls waiting room built up by the college.
- ➤ Hostel facilities are available for girl students. Financial concession is given in admission and hostel fees to girl's students.
- ➤ Balbhim College is only one college in a Beed district that has "Girls N.C.C. Unit."
- For girl students "Women Empowerment Cell" is working in college to give better facilities. This shows the priority given by the college to female students and solving their problems to make education more suitable and convenient for them.

- Supporting services run by the college like NCC and NSS.
- Awareness and interest has been created about the pure science courses by organizing the programmes every year like "State level Science talent search exam" and "State level Science exhibition".
- School students are invited to visit the exhibition along with their teachers, with the purpose of motivating them towards higher education.

2.2 Catering to student diversity.

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

There have an inclusive academic ambience in the campus by giving special attention to the needs of the differently-abled students.

- During the admission process college teachers gives special guidelines to physically challenged students.
- Educational counseling to cater the academic, individual and emotional problems of the differently-abled students.
- The college library has the facility of e-books which is helpful to the physically challenged students, as they do not have to search for books elsewhere.
- In examination writer is provided and also given half an hour extra time in the internal and university examination for the physically challenged students.
- The college supports financial assistance to SC/STOBC/minority/EBC students who are differently-abled students through scholarship section of college by forwarding their cases to the state Social Welfare Department for grant of scholarship.
- The college library provides a reading room at ground floor to physically challenged students.
- The teachers and staff of our college always help and motivate to physically challenged students for their academic and personal achievements and motifs.
- The college has provided ramp facility for the physically challenged students.
- The facilities audio, video aids also provide by college to differently abled students in teaching learning process.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

Yes, in order to assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills, the college has adopted the following process.

- Before the commencement of programme, admission committee takes the review of every student regarding their knowledge and skills. Accordingly they are guided to take the admission to the programmes which are suitable for them on the best level.
- They are advice to attain to courses concern subjects such as Spoken English, Remedial Courses.
- A teacher provides information about reference books, basic books, extra lectures.
- The college admission committee gives opportunity to students to change his/hers admitted course to other course within month duration.
- The college teacher's are always interact with the students during the initial lectures in the classrooms to assess their knowledge and skills.

2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/Add on/Enrichment Courses etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

Teachers are instructed to identify slow learners, advanced learners, so as to bridge the gap between them. Therefore incentive teaching is provided by the teachers.

The previous academic performance helps the teachers to identifying the slow learners and advanced learners. The teachers also detect such students while interactions with them in the class room.

The college has adopted following strategies to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them cope with the programme choice.

- (A) Remedial coaching of respective subjects is given to slow learners, the UGC has given financial assistance under XI plan to run coaching classes for SC/ST/OBC/minority students who are academically lacking behind.
- (B) Students who are weak in English language skills are instructed to join career oriented programme in communication in English which is financially supported by UGC through XI plan.
- (C) Students of Commerce Faculty, who are weak in basic knowledge of Accounting and Auditing are ask to join the career oriented programme in Accounting and Auditing for which the financial assistance by UGC XI plan.
- (D) Students of Science Stream who are interested advice to join the career oriented programme in Soil and Water Analysis, which is financially supported by UGC under XI plan.
- (E) Student progress is reviewed through conducting class tests and assigning tutorials and evaluating them.
- (F) To enhance the practical knowledge of students academic and industrial trips arranged by the respective departments.
- (G) Guest lectures of academicians are arranged to update the knowledge of students.
- (H) Students are acquainted with modern and sophisticated tools and instruments, which are being used in analysis.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

The college sensitizes its staff and students on various issues through the following activities.

A) Gender Sensitivity:

- The college has established women cell to know complaints regarding girl students and women staff members of the college as per the direction given by Supreme court "Vishakha Judgement".

- Anti-ragging cell is established for avoiding ragging in college campus.
- We have prevention cell for sexual harassment of women is established for such incidences.
- The college has participated in a movement "Jagar Janivacha Abhiyan", as per direction given by Government of Maharashtra State and own first, second prizes at district level in year 2013 and 2014 respectively.
- To make aware about disproportional ratio of male-female, "Beti Bachav" Campaign is launched and rally was organized in the city.
- The rally was organized in village, Charhata, adopted by our college N.S.S. unit.
- The college has NCC unit for girls under the Miss Dr.S.S.Bhosale, having capacity 53 girl cadets.

B) Environment:

- One compulsory paper of Environment Science is being taught to students to make aware of environment.
- The college campus kept "Tobacco Free" and suggestion regarding this are displayed at prominent places.
- Every year our NSS/NCC students do 'Tree Plantation' at adopted village places.
- To avoid the effect of hazardous chemicals and their fumes, therefore chimney is setup in Chemistry Laboratory.
- Exhaust fans are also setup at all the science laboratories.
- The college Geography Department celebrates "Vasundhara Din" every year. On this occasion poster, models, rangoli exhibition are arranged to make our students and staff aware about environment.
- Rain water harvesting project is being run by the college.
- Waste product management by using vermin compost culture.
- E-waste drop box is setup in college and e-waste is sent to concern companies for recycle.

Conference on problem in Marathwada region was organized to make aware the students and staff and public in general about water crisis in future. In this conference eminent water expert Prof. Purandare and others delivered most significant lectures on the problem.

C) Inclusion:

- Holistic development of our students and to make aware about social, ethical values we observe birth and death anniversaries of our great national heroes and social reformers. We arrange lectures on their thoughts and life works to make India in integrated and modern country.
- To eliminate blind beliefs and superstitions among the society we have arranged a lecture of late activist Narendra Dabholkar.
- A lecture of prominent justice and social thinker Hon. B.G.Kolse Patil on the occasijon of Shiv Jayanti to enlighten the students about the Shiv Charitra.
- A lecture of Shri Nanasaheb Patil on "Atomic Power: Curse or Boon" to human being was arranged.
- A lecture of Dr.Surekha Marathe was arranged about the stress and strain management.
- Gandhi and Vivekanand Study Centres are being run by the college.
- The college has conducted "Health Campaign" on 8th March 2012 under guidance of Dr. Yadav Sir.
- Miss Kalpana Gupte (Director of IGNOU Regional Centre, Pune) is invited as chief guest of the "AASTHA BREAST CANCER GROUP" programme on dated 23rd July 2011.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of Advanced Learners?

Our college teachers identify the advanced learners from their merit lists. After interaction with them during lectures and practical's their educational/learning needs identified. After identifying the special educational/learning needs, the college

- Responsible to satisfy these needs through the following means.
- Our concern faculty members suggest available reference books and journals as per their needs.
- Every department has its own departmental library to fulfill needs of study material for needy students.
- Advanced learners are advice to spent more time in laboratories and do practical works.
- B.S.R. projects are allotted to final year students on merit basis.
- Teaches help them to carry out experiments independently by arranging new experiments using research instruments.
- The college has e-library and e-journal facility by applying INFLIBNET software. Under this software there are 92604 e-books and 91 e-journals to which there is free access to all the students and faculties.
- The college has established seven smart rooms, one language laboratory. A separate IT Laboratory for Commerce students,

- Common Facility Centre with seminar hall considering the special needs of advanced learners.
- Well equipped laboratories and with sophisticated instruments like FTIR, Laminar air flow etc.
- To motivate student's state level science exhibition is organized and state level science talent search examinations are organized.
- To harness potential in advanced learners, we arrange lectures of experts in every subject.
- Research projects on various subjects are assigned to students.
- The students are encouraged to give internship on the job training in summer/winter vacations.
- The college arranges campus interview through Placement Cell.
- To promote for competitive examinations out teachers guides for needy students.
- 2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of dropout (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?
- The college conducts the data academic performance of the students from the university result sheets. The faculty takes and note regular attendance, punctuality and details of reasons for absents from the students through discussion with them. The teachers conduct class tests and home assignments and through which evaluate the performance of the student. After comparing the enrollment of last year with the present year the drop out students are detected.
- The Beed district is known for the "District of sugarcane cutters". Majority of the parents of our students migrate from the village to elsewhere in the state and other state across country. During the "Sugarcane harvest season" due to this these students deprived from teaching-learning process. Some of these needy students are selected under "Earn and Learn" scheme to help them.
- To avoid the dropout, the college offers concession in fees such needy students.
- The students from disadvantaged of sections of society are counseled about the importance of education to make their future career prosperous and bright and advice to postpone their marriages till the completion of higher education.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process:

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic Calendar, teaching plan, evaluation, blue print, etc.)

The teaching-learning process is students centric. Considering this, the college adopts various strategies and mechanism in advance and designs academic calendar.

Within the framework of academic calendar, teaching plans are prepared by individual teachers and accordingly to teaching plan, every teacher maintains teachers' diary. The details of these are given as under:

Academic Calendar:

The academic calendar is prepared for every academic year at the commencement of academic sessions. The details of academic activities to be carried by each department, during the academic year are informed to the IQAC.

IQAC prepares the comprehensive academic calendar on the basis of details submitted by all the departmental heads. Such academic calendar is prepared in the light of working days during the academic year communicated by the university.

The committee consisting the principal of the college as chairman and all the heads of the department prepare the comprehensive academic calendar in consultation with IQAC. While preparing academic calendar, factors public holidays, national and religious festivals, schedule of the examinations, extra-curricular activities etc. are in consideration.

Schedule of academic calendar consists:

- Period of admission process
- Course commencement dates and closing dates
- Schedule of internal examination for all courses
- Schedule of university examinations
- The dates of significant co-curricular and extra-curricular activities
- Annual Social Gathering days
- Election schedule of Students' Council under Act 1994.
- Dates of academic, administrative body meetings
- Celebration of important days
- Period of N.S.S./N.C.C. camps
 After the preparation of academic calendar, it provided to all the teachers along with annual and daily teaching plan diaries.

Time table:

A time table committee is constituted at the beginning of academic year. This committee prepares time table by considering different academic programmes and available class rooms and laboratories.

The Committee providetime table to each department and all faculties applied it for academic year. After getting the departmental time table, the Head of concern Department arrange a meeting of all his colleagues. In this meeting, courses to be taught during the academic year are discussed. After discussing the work load is distributed among all the faculty and internal time table of the department is prepared. The copies of class-wise time table are displayed on notice board of the concern department for the

information of students. The common time table of the programmes and courses is displayed on central notice boards & in reading rooms for students.

> Teaching Plan:

Each department teachers obtain a copy of own time table and courses assigned to them. On the basis of this, teachers prepare annual and daily teaching plans and gets approval from Head of the Department.

While preparing the teaching plan, every teacher takes into consider contents of the course to be taught, methods/technical of teaching to be applied, books and journals to be referred, new teaching/study to be generated etc. A separate time table for teaching by use of ICT is also taken into consideration.

Extra lectures/periods are arranged by teachers to compensate the lost schedule days due to accidental reasons. Such extra periods are mentioned in teaching plan diary after their conduction of such lectures.

> Teachers' Diary:

Every teacher prepares daily teaching plan on day before actual teaching of the course content. Head of the Department ensures that annual and daily teaching plans are executed and syllabus of the course is completed in time by day to day observation. At the end of each term, every teacher gets the approval from the Principal for completion of the course syllabus, taking into consideration, Head of the Department's remark.

Time table, annual and daily teaching plans are modified as and when required due to unavoidable changes in working days.

Evaluation Blue Print:

The university prescribes the pattern and scheme of marking for question papers and practical examination of each course and programme. At the commencement of course, the concern teacher explains the students about the course content, examination patter and scheme of marking.

- The university uploads the examination schedule on its website. Generally, by downloading the examination schedule, it is displayed on college notice boards for the information of concerned students.
- Internal examinations are conducted by the concerned subject teacher as per the academic calendar and time table.
- Students are also instructed to submit home assignments, response sheet within given period. After assessing internal examination answer papers and home assignments response sheets, marks are uploaded on the website of university within the link period.
- Students of second year, third year under graduate programme and post graduate programmes give their examination on the examination centres allotted to them by the university. While first year under graduate give their examination at home centre.

- After examination, answer scripts of first year under graduate students are assessed by the concern subject teacher at the college. While answer scripts of other programmes are sent either to District Assessment Centre or the University for their Evaluation.
- The university collects mark sheets from home examination centre and District Assessment Centre by way of soft and hard copies within the stated period. After their consolidation, the university declares programme-wise examination results.
- If students have
- any doubt about his result, can obtain a photocopy of his/her assessed answer script of concerned course. The concerned student approaches to his teacher and shows that photo copy for his remarks. If the teacher thinks that there is a scope for improvement of results, which can advice for re-evaluation of the answer sheet to the university.
- The university has adopted a choice based credit and grading system for first year students of post graduate programmes. Accordingly, the pattern external and internal assessment is adopted by the college. The students are given information about changes in the pattern by organizing their workshops. Under this pattern there are some core courses and one service course for each academic programme. Accordingly to this pattern projects, home assessments will be assigned to students and also seminars, group discussions will be assigned. The students are evaluated by considering their performance in such activities. The university will give grades in ten point scale on the basis internal and external performance of the student.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improving the teaching-learning process?

The college is committed for quality for which IQAC was established as per the directives of NAAC in June 1994. Since then it has been working actively and has proved its important role as a guiding star for teaching-learning process.

The contribution of IQAC in teaching-learning process is as follows:

- ➤ IQAC suggests certain guidelines for making impartial process of admission. It also suggests providing the information regarding subject combination, fees structure & scope of the subject to the student.
- ➤ IQAC also suggests faculty to take proper care and provide proper guidance to slow and advanced learners. For such certain remedial and bridge courses, organize seminars and group discussion are suggested.
- ➤ IQAC prepares academic plan and provided to the faculty. It also suggests making use of different teaching methods. Teaching is made more effective by the faculty using different teaching methods as lecture method, inter active method, project based learning, computer, LCD assisted learning, use of models and charts, students seminar, group discussion, video conferencing and internet access etc.
- > IQAC has organized seminars and one day workshop on effective teaching and use of ICT in teaching. Until now IQAC has organized

- twenty eight seminars on effective teaching and use of ICT with the help of different departments.
- ➤ IQAC motivates the faculty members to participate in programmes on new and emerging technology. The faculty members have attended such programmes organized by INFOSYS and other institutions.
- ➤ IQAC provides feedback sheet to the students in order to make an academic audit of faculty. This feedback form on class room teaching is obtained from the students and necessary suggestions are given to the faculty.
- ➤ IQAC conducts meeting with faculty and discusses different ways of quality enhancement.
- ➤ IQAC plays a significant role to make teaching-learning process more students centric.
- ➤ IQAC encourages the faculty to participate in various seminars, conferences and workshops to enrich and update their knowledge.

2.3.3 How is learning made more student centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like inter active learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

Students are main pivot of college. To make teaching-learning process student centric and more effective, new techniques and technologies are to be adopted. As this is the era of science and technology that way the concept learning is changing fastly. It is necessary to adopt new system and pedagogy in learning i.e. learning, audiovisual learning and online learning.

To make learning more students centric, the following strategies are adopted.

- > Classroom teaching helps students to develop hearing capacity.
- Assigning practical work like preparation of posters, models and small projects enables the students to enhance creativity- analytical and critical faculty, innovative skills & ideas, research outlook.
- Arranging study tours for broadens knowledge and wisdom of students. They get practical and theoretical knowledge. They understand their own competence as compared with students elsewhere.
- > Students know new technological, economical and social development and opportunities available to them in wide area.
- > By arranging seminar, presenting paper, stage course. It includes habit of self-study.
- > Students can present their views through group discussion.
- ➤ Opinions are presented before the other fellow members of the group. Convincing power can be developed among the students. Thinking ability of various globe of the subject. Taking consideration into all group members, students can know what is right and what is wrong. Practical view is developed.
- ➤ Use of ICT technique makes learning more effective and visible.
- Language Laboratory develops pronunciation power, writing, listening and communication skill of the students.

Conclusion:If above strategies are adopted and implemented effectively, learning becomes student centric and the holistic development of student may become possible.

Supporting structure and system are available in our institution.

- ➤ View of the above strategies to be followed, the college has following structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and inter dependent learning among the students.
- ➤ Interactive learning: Computer with internet facility, CFC hall, smart rooms, independent computer laboratory for commerce students, computer laboratory for science and Computer Science students.
- ➤ Every department has internet facility, well-equipped science laboratories, language laboratory and common facility centre for science students.

(B)Collaborative learning:

- ➤ Some experiments, projects, models, posters are assigned to the students in pairs or in groups of students.
- ➤ Some of the curricular activities like report writing, organizing seminars, quizzes, debates, group discussion are carried out by a group of students.
- ➤ The College organizes State Level Science Exhibition: In which students participate in group under various activities.

(C) <u>Independent learning:</u>

The college provides INFLBNET software in library to refer various e-books and e-journals independently. Lab. experiments are carried by individual student independently. Some of the students present their papers in a seminar independently under U.G.C., B.S.R. scheme various projects are allotted to the students of science faculty and they perform it independently.

Management encourages teachers to participate and organize in development programme, in seminar, workshop, which help them to update their knowledge, adopt innovative teaching methods and ideas.

2.3.4 How does the institute nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the student to transform them into lifelong learner and innovators?

- The Faculties actively participates in the seminars/ workshops/ conferences at international/national/state level and regional level organized by other institutes.
- Every department assigns short term project to the student which helps them to develop carrying out research, writing project report, publishing and presenting research papers.
- The Commerce Department has organized a seminar for only students on various issues related to commerce which help them to know how to organize and conduct the proceeding of event. The students themselves prepare and present research papers, anchoring the proceeding and conducting the seminars. Through this students learn application of event management in practice.
- The different departments arrange study tours and visits various places to uplift the knowledge of the students as well as national laboratories and universities every academic year. This result made percolates wisdomin the students. For example, the Life Science Department organized visit to aquarium, wild life sanctuariesand fisheries projects to note and collect variety of species.

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students/bnefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advise) provided to students.

In the college students are admitted from different background. To require special kind of support from the college teachers.

> Academic Counseling:

Academic counseling's is given to the students. The admission committee consisting experienced teachers from various subjects are help to the students for selecting course, programmes while taking the admission. After admission, if a student knows that course or a programme chosen by him/her is not suitable, he/she can take the advice from the Principal and senior faculty for the change within the specific period.

Personal Guidance to the students:

Personal guidance to the students is provided by the faculty, head of the department and higher authority.

> Personal and Psy-Social Support:

The Psychology Department handle Psy-Social Problems. The relationship problems, emotional problems and the problems of adjustments are tackled by the faculty smoothly. 0.5 students are benefited from this counseling.

Career Counseling:

The Science Department of the college conducts State Level Science Talent Search Examination which helps the students to know their abilities for future career. Near about four thousand students from all over Maharashtra have been benefited from such facility. The college has Career and Counseling Cell under merged scheme of U.G.C. which also helps the students to choose their future career.

2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years. What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and what is the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

During last four years, the faculty of the college have adopted the following innovative teaching approaches/methods to make learning more interesting and effective.

- A common time table for ICT based teaching is prepared. Every faculty is delivering lectures by using ICT as per the common time table for the said purpose.
- Some of the faculty use related models and charts while teaching.
- Some of the faculty arrange seminars for students on a topic related to prescribe syllabi of the subject.
- Some faculty organize debate on a subject related to the syllabus.
- Assigning short term project.
- Mathematics teachers teach through games, brain teasing and e-books.
- Language & Drama teachers teach drama through video clips, documentaries and films.
- Commerce and English teachers teach communication skills through arranging group discussions, role playing and simulation models.
- Language teacher teach grammar, pronunciation through digital software in the Language Laboratory.
- Commerce and Journalism teachers assign drafting newsletters, drafting of advertisement, report writing.
- Social Science teachers assign minor survey of a particular area and ask to submit and analytical report on that.
- Inter-disciplinary approach in teaching is also applied in some departments like Marathi, English, Hindi such as short story is taught in dramatic manner. It resulted in teaching more effective.

Innovative Efforts by the institution:

To encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches the institution has made the following efforts.

- The college has established seven smart rooms for teaching by using ICT methods.
- The college has also established a well-equipped Language Laboratory.
- The college has IT and Compute Laboratory for Commerce & Computer Science students.
- The college also has Common Facility Centre with ultra-modern Common instrument for Life and Physical Science stream.
- Every department is provided with a computer with internet facility.
- Some of the faculty are provided with Laptops for academic purposes under the scheme of U.G.C.
- The college has audio-video and digital camera for recording the events. The library of the college has INFLIBNET software for referring e-books and e-journals for the teachers and students also.

- The college has organized workshops for orienting the faculty about using ICT.
- The college provides necessary finance for making teaching models and applying other innovative practices.
- The students get benefits of free access in using e-library and e-journals.
- The impact of above practices on the students are their attendance in the classroom is increased. Ultimately their academic performance is also improved.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

The central library of the college has 93,809 books, 93 journals and periodicals for reading references. The College also provides to its faculty and students personal ID to have easy access to INFLIBNET site. Offering 80,409 e-books and 3828 e-journals, periodicals (bound volumes) 3,519.

The central library also provide a separate reading hall for staff and students with essential reference books and journals.

The college gets bound the volumes some of the important journals and periodicals for a specific time period. For smooth access to the library, the central library has separate under graduate and post graduate sections. The central library is fully automated with DELNET system.

Apart from the central library every department has its own departmental library. Every departmental library keeps some of the typical research thesis, dissertation and research papers and study materials.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes' elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

Yes, in few situations such as holidays caused by national strikes, elections and natural disasters, the college faces challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame. Sometimes some extra-curricular activities cause delay in completing the curriculum. Leaving aside the above matters, our teachers maintain a diary in which they plan their teaching for the whole academic year and see that whatever is planned has to be completed within given time.

To encounter such challenges, our teachers conducts extra classes during public holidays and Sundays. Also such missed lectures are conducted after regular classes and mentioned in teaching plan diary.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

- Daily teaching diary of teachers is monitored daily by the Head of respective department as well as by the Principal at the end of each term.
- 2) University results of students are analyzed subject wise. It clearly indicates teaching quality of teachers.
- 3) IQAC has provided ready format of feedback from students. Feedback is analyzed by IQAC and after analization, IQAC gives suggestions if needed to the respective faculty members.
- 4) The college provides self-appraisal at the end of each term for monitoring syllabus complication and extra-curricular activities of teachers.
- 5) Academic audit is another significant means used by the institute for monitoring evaluation process.
- 6) Every year, the college gets certified from ISO which gives certificate at every three years which assures good quality of teaching-learning process.

2.4 Teacher Quality:

2.4.1 Provide the following details and elaborate on the strategies adopted by the college in planning and management (recruitment and retention) of its human resources (qualified and competent teachers) to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum.

The recruitment of teachers of the college is carried out by parent institute Marathwada Shikshan Prasarak Mandal, Aurangabad every academic year. The requirement of teachers with subject specialization is submitted to the parent institute by Principal. Special committee of Marathwada Shikshan Prasarak Mandal scrutinizes the requirements and took appropriate actions.

The human resource recruitment strategies adopted by the college are as follows:

- 01. Assess the need for human resources from various departments and section of the college. The vacancy positions are communicating to the management by the Principal.
- 02. The college submits subject-wise workload on the basis subject-wise strength of the students along with the list of existing staff to the Joint Director of Higher Education, Aurangabad.
- 03. The Joint Director, Higher Education, Aurangabad scrutinizes the workload as per government norms and sanctions the post for filling.
- 04. Vacant posts are conveyed to the Special Cell of Dr.Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad.
- 05. Get the roster of reservation of posts approved from the University. Obtain the NOC from the government for filling the post and allows the publication of the advertisement.

- 06. Advertise the post in prominent Marathi and English newspapers as well as on M.S.P. Mandal and college website also university website and in employment news.
- 07. Get Selection Committee approved from the university committee consisting of university nominee, subject expert, government representative and experts nominated by the Management is formed to an interview and appoint competent and select the eligible meritorious and qualified candidates.
- 08. Applicants with doctoral and post doctoral degree are given preference.

To meet the changing requirement of the curriculum.

- 01. Allow teacher to attend orientation/refresher courses or short term courses to upgrade their knowledge.
- 02. Support in term of accessibility to infrastructure and equipments.
- 03. Provide conducive environment for their professional growth.
- 04. Support from the Local Managing Committee of the college in term of granting and sanctioning special study leave to the teachers.
- 05. Peer support and support from the Principal to the teacher for Teaching-Learning Process and other college responsibility. These helps to measures help the college to retail adequate and well qualified faculty. The following are brief of the faculty for various departments.

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

Yes. The evaluation of teachers has done in following manners.

Evaluation by students:

The feedback forms are designed by the Principal, Vice-Principal and IQAC. After prescribing the feedback form, its copies has provided to the students at the end of each term. After get filled the feedback forms from the students such forms has collected and submitted to IQAC. The IQAC analyses the feedback forms relating to each teacher and their results are shared with the concern faculty to seek improvement in the teaching learning process. However, we have established a mechanism for internal assessment of teachers through teaching plan diary, API and CAS/PBAS.

A teaching plan diary provided to each teacher is attached with a form of revealing the performance. Every teacher has to fill up these forms and submit to the Principal with remark of Head of the Department. This form is just like a self-assessment report of the teacher. In this report, the teacher has to mention whether the syllabus is completed as per the schedule, if not completed the reasons for incompletion, extra periods engaged for completing the syllabus, class test and tutorials taken, academic performance of the students, efforts made by the teachers for improving the performance of the students etc. He has mentioned the additional work assigned by the college or department. This performance is assessed by Head of the Department and the Principal and then it is submitted IQAC.

The API forms designed and prescribed by affiliating university provided to the faculty by IQAC. It is filled-up by faculty and again submitted to IQAC. The forms are verified and assessed by IQAC and score are given.

As a result of evaluation a positive impact on teaching-learning process has been noticed.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation process?

- At the beginning of academic year all teachers explain to the students about question paper pattern of examination and marking system.
- Departmental library provides question paper bank to the students along with solutions.
- College makes the academic calendar of class tests and it has been displayed on notice board of every department.
- University circular pertaining to the pattern of examination and the pattern of the question papers are displayed on notice board of respective department as well as central display board.
- Faculty members attend the workshops on evaluation process and recent updates of syllabus.
- Parents get to know the evaluation methods through college website and SMS.
- From the academic year 2015-2016 the university and its affiliated colleges have adopted CBCS (choice based credit and grading system) for P.G. students to make aware about this university has organized workshop for all P.G. teachers and students. The college has also organized faculty wise workshop for the students to make aware about the new pattern.
- Faculties as well as students are well aware about recent changes in syllabus as well as pattern of question papers through this type of workshop.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluartion reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

Evaluation reforms initiated by university:

- Semester system has been introduced to all U.G. and P.G. level.
- It consist of 50 mark 20 marks to internal evaluation and 30 marks allotted to university examination.
- Internal assessment system has been eliminated by university i.e. 2013-2014. Presently the university semester an examination is of 50 marks
- Examinations are conducted by the college as per the schedule provided by the university.
- An evaluation of students' academic performance/progress done by centralized process. The assessment of answer books is done by expert teachers, invited from all the colleges affiliated to the university.
- For post graduate courses have adopted (CBCS) choice based credit system pattern from 2015-2016.

Evaluation reforms initiated by institution:

- Evaluation of students' academic performance/progress by the teachers through class test, group discussion, seminar, viva, research project, survey, etc.
- Students are assessed by the teachers though frequent interactions in the initial lectures.
- The students can apply for revaluation of their answer scripts of semester and examination by paying prescribed fee to University.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

- University has awarded to our college for 'Ideal Examination Centre Award' in 2010 for smooth conduct examinations.
- College has DCAS centre for assessment of answer papers.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative evaluation approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

➤ Formative evaluation is done through of internal assessment by each department at under graduate & post graduate level. It includes classroom attendance, home assignment, test, tutorial, participation in co-curricular activities etc.

Internal evaluation/assessment process helps to increase the classroom attendance & also students participation in learning process.

➤ Summative assessment is done at the end of every semester by taking written examination. Its helps to determine the final performance of students.

2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuing rigor and transperancy in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightage assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.)

- Transparency is made by displaying the marks of assignment & class test on the notice board. It helps to increase competitive spirit among students.
- Answer book is shown to the students to know their performance and to make improvement revaluation is done if necessary.
- Projects are given to the students either in groups or in individuals it develops collaborating thinking among the students.
- Through the project work the college finds out students ability and motivates them. It helps to enhance their various skills.
- Communication skill & subject content at under graduate and post graduate level, seminar presentation is practiced.
- In order to develop discussion making power the group discussion are also organized. It also enhances communicative abilities.

Weightages is given to the students' regularity & punctuality in the class & also to his active participation in the class.

2.5.6 What are the graduate attributes specied by the college /affiliateing university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

The mission of the college is to provide quality education to socially and economically backward classes. Our institute also aims in bringing about educational and cultural development of rural mass. Constant efforts are made by the institution to bring social transformation through education. Keeping in view the mission of the institution efforts are made to uplift the students by their cultural, ethical and intellectual development. Considering this, the college keeps in mind some attribute while imparting the knowledge to the student. College is running not only the basic courses but many skills oriented and applied courses which help the students to develop some skill during their education. Some of the attributes and skills to be attained by the students after graduation are as follows:

- A sound knowledge of the subject.
- They will have an effective communication skill and also problem solving skills.
- They will be able to understand and handle modern technology.
- A responsible global citizen.
- They will have a social responsibility. For this institute has developed a Gandhian Study Centre and Vivekanand Study Centre.
- College helps the student in attaining these attribute by conducting various academic activities and also the required co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.

2.5.7 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

Redressal of grievances:

The grievances with reference to evaluation are sort out at college and university level. The following mechanism is followed at college and university level.

- 1) College level: After the internal examination, the answer books are checked by the concerned faculty and it is shown to the students in the class. Marks lists are displayed on the notice board. If a student feels some query, he can approach to the concerned teacher. The teacher shows him the assessed answer-sheet to satisfy him.
- 2) <u>University level:</u> As per the guidelines and directives of Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad, the student can apply for verification and revaluation of marks. For this he can obtain a photocopy of the answer book by paying the required fees

The chairman of the examination committee at college level is chief examination officer where as the controller of examination

at university level look after this matter by appointing appropriate members.

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- [2] University Level: As per the guidelines and directives of University, the students can apply for verification and revaluation of marks. For this he can obtain a photocopy of the answer book by paying the required fees.

2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes:

2.6.1 Does the college have clearly stated learning outcomes? If 'yes' give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

- Yes, the college is dedicated to student progress by taking various efforts on the institutional and faculty level. The main aim of institution is all-round development of students as well as staff members.
- The teaching staff formulates learning outcomes for each course and academic programme. Graduate attributes for students consist of communication skill, presentation power, life skills, social values and problem solving abilities, while post graduate attributes for students consist of research attitude, analytical abilities, social awareness etc. These outcomes are well defined by the teaching staff.
- To inspire students about learning outcomes, college organizes an induction meeting with Principal. Each department also organizes a programme for freshers at the commencement of academic year. In this programme Head of the department as well as senior faculty members made aware the students about probable outcomes of the courses and academic programme.
- At the beginning of the academic year the staff meeting is organized in which the principal addresses about running various courses and programme to inculcate learning outcomes in the students.

- displayed in the college magazine. Student having outstanding performance is selected for "Balbhim Puraskar" every year.
- The Departments are prepared subject wise result sheets after the examination result declared by the university.

2.6.3 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

- [B] Formative strategy: Written test, orals, vice-voce, assignment and practical work, assigning tutorials, short term research projects.
- [C] Summative strategy: Written & practical examination.

2.6.4 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (students placements,

entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students etc) of the courses offered?

The institution takes initiatives to enhance the social and economic relevance of the courses offered as follows.

- Placement cell: The college established a separate placement and career guidance cell for placement assistance and guiding the students about preparation for the selected process. The cell invites several IT companies, business and industries concerns for placement.
- Entrepreneurship: The Department of Commerce and Management Science organizes lectures of leading entrepreneurs and professionals for inculcating entrepreneurship quality among the students. The students are also guided about to the preparation of projects, reports and proposals for financial assistance from the financing agencies. The success stories of renowned entrepreneurs are also introduced in the curriculum of Commerce. The students take inspirations, motivation from such stories.

Innovation and research aptitude:

- To develop research culture among the students, short term research projects are assigned to Postgraduate students. The college also selects some students on merit basis for short term research project under UGC-BSR scheme. From these research project student knows about primary and secondary data collection, their analysis, finding the results and giving suggestions or recommendation for overcoming lacunas. This inculcates research culture among the student. The institute has organized national level seminar on research methodology in which post graduate student of Science and Social science stream actively participated. This activity helped them to understand most of the horizons of research.
- State level science exhibition organized by the college also helps the student in developing research aptitude by making different models.
- The programme "Jagar Janivacha Abhiyan" organized by college also inculcates the awareness about gender inequality among the student.

2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyze data on student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

- In order to analyze the data on student performance and getting the expected learning outcome the following mechanism is done by the college.
- The class tests and internal examination of the students are conducted. The performance of the student can be clearly observed from the mark lists. This performance of the student in the examination can acts as a parameter to judge their learning outcome.

- The comparative study of the academic result indicates the academic weakness of the student. Orientation of these weaker students is done by the concerned faculty and further counseling of the students is made to make further improvement.
- If poor performance of the students is observed by the faculty in a particular paper or subject then efforts are made by the faculty to make teaching more learner oriented. Similarly the remedial steps are also taken by the faculty to make the improvement of slow learners.
- College also collect feed back of the students, which help him to extract the expected learning outcome of the student.

2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

Following measures are undertaken in monitoring and ensuring the achievement of learning outcome.

- The curriculum is designed and given to the affiliated college by the university. By making a time bound teaching plan, by taking extra periods where ever necessary and by following strictly the academic calendar, the curriculum allotted is effectively completed by the teachers.
- Completion of syllabus as per teaching plan, planning as per the academic calendar also monitors the completion of syllabus.
- Monitoring of learning outcome is also done by reviewing of results of the student and the overall performance of the students.
- The Head of the Department take the review of the curriculum at the end of the term. Similarly, Principal also takes review and monitors the process and ensures the learning outcome.

Only one faculty member of this institute, Shri. S.S. Undare, Dept. of Chemistry availed two years study Leave for completion of Ph.D. studies.

- ➤ Department of Agro Chemicals and Fertilizers and department of Microbiology provides the facility of Soil analysis for farmers and food analysis for society free of cost respectively.
- ➤ Department of Botany and department Zoology create awareness about organic farming and vermiculture for farmers respectively by providing their importance.

- ➤ Department of Commerce provided free of cost filling the Income Tax Returns form and are useful to staff as well as communities including Businessman.
- > Students of History department give the information about historical places near Beed city i.e. Kankaleshower temple, Khajana vihir, Khandeshowari temple, Kapil dhar etc to tourists.
- ➤ Department of Chemistry provided analysis of pharmaceutical samples by using FT-IR.

- All the departments from Science faculty are specially constructed Having well furnished and equipped laboratories, where the UG and PG students are getting benefitted. These labs are also used for research work. **There** are 21 laboratories for general programmes and 2 Research Labs. (One in Chemistry and one in Zoology Dept.)
- Common Facility Centre (CFC) in having high profile research Equipment's like: Hot Air Oven, Digital Balance, p H meter, UV, Student microscope, Computers, Haemometer, Mufel furnace magnetization Apparatus. Susceptibility set up, Laminar Air Flow Electrojel phoresis.
- Language Laboratory is the latest mode for teaching and learning facility with Audio-visual effect installed with ORELL software.
- ➤ Zoology Dept is having MUSEUM with invertebrates and vertebrate specimens which are preserved.

Extra Curricular activities like Sports (Indoor and Outdoor), NCC, NSS, Cultural activities are attraction for many students so the college has provided all these facilities for the student to build up their personality. Both wings of NCC (Boys and Girls) are working very effectively under 51 MAH. Bat.

Sports -

To cover indoor events special rooms are provided like Gymnasium Hall, Table Tennis hall, Chess etc.

Special infrastructure is made available for the events like Volleyball, Hockey, Football, Cricket Kho-kho, Kabaddi, Soft Ball, Athletics Track.

NCC -

The NCC unit of our college is attached to 51 Maharashtra Battalion which is affiliated to Army Wing Maharastra Directorate. For Boys the capacity is 53 and for Girls it is 53. The infrastructure for NCC is very finely placed. This dept. is working very hard due to which the cadets from our college has represented leadership in the Republic Day Parade at Rajpath, Delhi.

NSS-

NSS is having special room and Stores. NSS unit of our college is one of the biggest 3 units with 300 enrolled students of which 200 boys and 100 girls students are enrolled. Our unit runs the programmes throughout the year as per the guidelines given by the NSS Head Office Dr. B. A. M. University, Aurangabad. Apart from this we use to adopt the village for three consecutive years where Water Shed, Tree Plantation Approach Roads, Percolation Tank, Pits care taking of HIV infants. Due to implementation of these various programmes NSS Unit of our college stand first in the university (2013-14) and the programme officer Dr. Mohite G. A. was also declared as Best Programme Officer by the university.

One of our NSS volunteer Sopan Munde was awarded Best Volunteer of University, State and National Level. He was awarded Indira Gandhi Best NSS volunteer of the year (2013-14) by the auspicious hand of Honb'le President of India Shri Pranab Mukharji.

Cultural Activities and Public Speaking –

Our college is having separate Music and Drama Dept. students from our college participate in Youth Festival organized by the University. Also they take part in various cultural competitions. Street play are also arranged on the sensitive social problems like Dowry, Save Girls child etc. special room for rehearsals is allotted (18 X 24 feet)



- ➤ Award of "Best Reader" to the student devoting maximum time in reading room.







Library, Language Lab etc. with net access.

- The college is provided with 10 mbps connectivity.
- A special provision of internet in the Library is made for students only.
 - > The Laptops provided to faculty are used for the preparation and Presentation.
 - For students the book facility is availed. They are used it.
 - The students and faculty is used Wi-Fi facility.

- The administrative wing is run the daily routine by using computers with Net facility to work smoothly and effectively.
- To run the daily routine of the administration, computers with net facility and printer are installed in various sections of administrative wing. This helps to carry on the work smoothly and effectively.
- The entire campus is covered under the vigilance of CCTV.
- As the IT field is fast growing and ever changing, to upgrade the existing IT is must.
- So, the college has installed latest version of software and upgraded computers with latest configuration.
- To grab the latest information from various websites available, innovative research work will be promoted.
- IT infrastructure is a main source of education for the courses like BCA, B. Sc. (Computer Science)
- College first assesses the requirement number of students and staff and plan according to the IT infrastructure.
- The up gradation has done in several ways in past five years.
- Old computers are shifted for hardware practical's and for web browsing.
- Specialized persons allotted to look after in the maintenance of IT infrastructure in the campus. Similarly the maintenance is done by hiring the persons from outside whenever required.
- As per the expansion of the department, starting of new programmes and need of the department the new IT infrastructure is added.
- The process of online admission, Library, Examination system, Scholarship form, Staff payment, Modern Teaching tools etc. act as a MIS of the college.
- The "IT" system is protected by using "Cyber Security" (Using antivirus and etc.)

4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college?

- The financial requirements are submitted to parent institute every year. Financial committee working on these matters scrutinizes the financial proposals. This committee finalizes these proposals. The Local Management committee (LMC) monitors the expenditure.
- ➤ One of the technicians appointed to maintain hardware and printers.
- A supervisor is appointed to maintain and repairs of the campus.
- Electrician works to repair electrical faults.
- ➤ One of the staff members looks after the furniture (Desks, Stools, Tables, Chairs, Cupboards etc.) and detects the scrapped furniture. The unfit furniture is repaired as whenever needed.
- Cleanness of the campus (Toilets, Parking lots, Bathrooms) is done by specially appointed scavengers.
- Maintenance of plumbing and water pipe line tanks (8 Sintex tanks of 1000 ltrs capacity and 1 underground water tank of 15,000 ltrs capacity) is done regularly by plumber.
- The specially appointed team of workers clean up the campus daily and the collected garbage is used for composting.

4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precession measures for the equipment/instruments?

- All the equipments/instruments in the labs are well maintained. The regular maintenance of the instruments is done as and when required.
- For the minor instruments like PH meter, Conductometers, Potentio meter etc. the calibrations are done. As per the standard methods (use of buffer solutions potassium chloride etc.) The process of calibration is carried out.

- For high end equipments like UV, FTIR technical experts are called and the maintenance is done whenever required. Some high end equipments are self calibrated.
- As per the guidelines given in the manuals of the instruments they are calibrated.
- The instruments like spectrometer-the graph is plotted, this graph is considered for another experiments
- ➤ GM Counter by plotting the graph the calibration is done.
- Frequency generator it is calibrated using CRO
- Digital pH meter, Analytical balance, conductometer, colorimeter, hot air oven, glass electrode, these instruments are calibrated by the faculty using standard processors whenever needed.

4.4.4 What are the major steps taken for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipment (voltage fluctuations, constant supply of water etc.)?

- ➤ The electricity supplied by the govt. may have fluctuations. Many sophisticated high end equipments are very sensitive for the current fluctuations. To avoid such critical problems main circuit breakers (MCB) are connected at suitable power supply units, earthling wire, Circuit brakes.
- > Two generators having capacity of 30 Kv and 25 kv are used at the time of load shading or current failure.
- ➤ In many places inverters are installed for regular and uninterrupted power supply.
- College is having bore well which is a main supply of water for the campus.
- ➤ Water storage tanks (8 Sintex tanks of 1000 ltrs capacity and 1 underground water tank of 15,000 ltrs capacity) are helpful for storing the water.
- ➤ The strength of the students is increasing every year, naturally the demand of water is increasing. To fulfill this demand, the ground water level of tube well should be maintained. For this college is following the path of Rain Water Harvesting.



As per the rules & regulations of government SC/ST, OBC students have reservation in admission process to various courses of the institute. The institute provides scholarships/free ships to these students through state government & central government agencies. Remedial coaching & NET/SET coaching are provided to SC/ST, OBC category students. For economically weaker students the institute provides the facility of installment of fees, scholarship like Economical Backward Class (EBC). Moreover, financial support is provided by institute to the needy students.

> Students with physical disabilities :-

These students are provided all types of support such as reservation in admission, scholarship/freeship etc. by the institute. During the examination these students are provided with extra time and writer (if needed) for the examination.

> Students to participate in various competitions National/International.

The institute provides personal as well as financial support to the students for participation in various competitions of cultural and sports departments. Also, students are encouraged to participate in activities organized by NCC and NSS. The sports department has various equipment, instrument of gymnasium, kits of different games, indoor & outdoor stadium for practices. As a result, many students have major achievements in sports and cultural events.

Medical assistance to students:- Health Centre, health insurance etc.

The institute provides health insurance for all students of the institute. Blood group detection and hemoglobin check-up camp are organized in the institute specially for girl students. Various departments of institute has a first-aid box for the purpose of minor accidents or initial treatments.

Organizing coaching for competitive exam:-

The institute established the competitive examination guidance centre to motivate the students towards competitive examination. The institute developed the Library having separate study room for competitive examination under which 500-600 books and 6 periodicals are available to students in the form of knowledge resource. Besides this institute conducts the NET/SET coaching scheme under which guest lecture of scholars , eminent persons, NET/SET passed out students are organized to boost the confidence of students.

> Skill development (Spoken English, Computer Literacy etc.

The institute has well developed the language lab to enhance the communication skill, presentation skill, English vocabulary and proficiency skills, personality development skills among the students.

The English department runs the certificate course of communication skills in english funded by UGC under which spoken english programmes are arranged by the department. To develop the entrepreneurial skills among the students, the institute organizes field visit, study tours to industry, guest lectures of eminent persons and industrialist. Also placement & training cell organizes training programmes for students.

> Support for "Slow Learners" -

The institute provided remedial coaching for slow learner

students. The various departments developed the separate curriculum of their subject and this is implemented very effectively. specially in the subject physics, mathematics, english, commerce students need extra coaching which is fulfilled by the lectures of remedial course.

business house etc.

The institute has training & placement cell through which Various training programmes and campus interviews are organized in the campus for the students. Study tours to industry and field visit of various departments are organized to motivate the students towards higher learning/business. Various programmes are organized through life- long learning and extension services.

Publication of student magazines :-

The institute publishes a magazines "Savendan" of students every year. This magazine contains the information about the co-curricular and extra-curricular activities/programmes conducted by college. Besides this essay ,thought provoc articles, poetry etc. written by students in Hindi, Marathi, English, Urdu, Sanskrit languages are published in this magazine. During the annual gathering programmes best writer is honored by the institute.

The knowledge and value based education with entrepreneurial skills will make the students more employable. To develop these skills in students the institute makes following efforts.

- Organization of guest lectures of eminent persons, industrialist in the institute.
- Career guidance lectures of Bank officers.

- The affiliated university has tie-up with INFOSYS, Bangalore under which the teachers of the affiliated colleges are trained to train students for the industry. Two teachers from the college have received the training in two categories of communication & soft skill enhancement and analytical skill development. This activity helps the students for training purpose.
- Organization of field visit and study tour to various industries.
- Various programmes organized through life- long learning and extension services.
- The parent institute, Marathwada Shikshan Prasarak Mandal, Aurangabad developed the central placement & training cell under which placement coordinator & members of placement cell are given three days training to increase student placement and industry interaction. This activity are result with positive outcomes.
- The faculty and students of the Drama department visited the national school of drama (NSD), CCRT, Indian people theater for enhancement of their practical knowledge and career opportunities.

The institute has committed to the holistic development of students. To achieve this, the institute makes following strategies.

- During the admission process, the NCC and NSS department display the notice about registration of students and various programs, activities run by the department. Most of the students voluntarily participate in these activities.
- The cultural unit of the institute, including Drama, Music departments organizes various competitions such as elocution, debate, essay writing, poetry recitation, Rangoli, poster, etc. On the occasion of the NSS day (24th Sept.) the NSS department celebrates "Karyprasidhi Saptah" in which different competition are organized for students. Also, students are encouraged to participate in the activities like elocution & debate competition organized at state/national level by other institutes.
- For sports loving students, the institute has indoor as well as outdoor sport stadium. Every year sport department organizes one sport competition at university level, such as Table Tennis, Boxing, Judo, Soft Ball, Cricket, Archery, Badminton, Volley Ball, Kho-Kho, Kabaddi, Weight Lifting etc. The sports equipment and various kits of games are provided to the students for their regular practice.
- Sport department received the grant of 1.10 crore from UGC for strengthening the sport facility. Under this various sports equipment,

- gymnasium equipment, kits of games are purchased and made available for the students.
- The students who are participating in extra-curricular and co-curricular activities, their academic loss is recompensed by personal counseling of concerned subjects. Also teacher of concerned subject provide the study material for home practice.
- The institute has Literary Association, Social Science Association, Science Association, Commerce Association in which students are working as member of the association. Different programmes are arranged by the association for motivation and participation of students.

In every academic year, students voluntarily organize the welcome function, the farewell function and celebrate the teachers day in the college.

- Financial support is provided to students for participation in various competitions of cultural department as well as sports department organized at the state / national level.
- During annual gathering, the institute organizes various sports as well as cultural competition for the students. The winner students of institute level and of university/state/national level are honored by giving Track Suit/T-shirts/Blazers, certificate, memento etc. for motivation and inspiration to other students.
- The institute organizes state level science exhibition and state level science talent search examination for enrichment of scientific temper in the students.

The college developed the separate library of competitive examination with the separate study room. This library has around 500-600 books of competitive examination and 6 periodicals. Most of the students of various departments are taking benefit of this facility.

Moreover, the institute has NET/SET Coaching Scheme and entry in services scheme. Guest lectures of scholars are organized by each department in regard of this. Also, faculty of each department provides academic as well as personal support for preparation of SET/SET examination.

Personal Counseling:

Faculty of college help students to solve their personal problems and problems related to academic in the college specially students from rural area are counseled by the respective department teacher.

Career Counseling:

The college has training and placement cell under which guest lectures, workshops on career guidance and campus interview of various well known companies are organized. The cell invites the people from various sectors like corporate, education and government for elaborating the career opportunities in the respective field. The college has Science Association, Commerce Association, Social Science Association, which organizes various programmes that are useful for student motivation.

Psycho-Social Counseling:

The college has undergraduate and post graduate department of Psychology through which various programmes are arranged for the psychological counseling for the students. The NSS department of the college plays a vital role in social counseling of students. Annual camps of NSS are organized in the villages which are nearby to the city. Students attending the camps have interaction between the people of the village by which there is an exchange of thoughts. Problems of village people and solution for them, all these activities develops the social responsibility in students. NSS department had their camp at Infant India a project run for AIDS affected children.

- 6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality, policy and plans?

Marathwada Shikshan Prasarak Mandal, Aurangabad is well known educational institution in Marathwada Region as well as in Maharashtra. Balbhim Arts, Science & Commerce College, Beed is also well known to all over the state. Being a part of this well known educational board, the College is linked with all sectors of society and educational sensibilities. Our college is situated in educationally and economically backward area which is neither connected with railway line nor industrial facilities developed. Yet the spark of intelligence is found in rural area. That is very remarkable. So our Mandal's policy is to concentrate on this rural intelligence to afford good quality education.

The college Local Governing Council, Principal, three Viceprincipals, IQAC, Registrar & Office Superintendent with all Heads and their colleagues are engaged in quality maintenance and upgradation of students at daily routine level work. The Management provides road map and general guide lines for academic and over all development policy.

In order to create excellence in all fields, the (LGC) consisting of representatives from Management, Teaching, Non-teaching staff alongwith Principal is committed to effective governance. The Local Governing Council guides planning, monitoring and evaluating mechanism, regarding administrative and academic processes as per Maharashtra University Act 1994.

The college, IQAC is working for qualitative progress of college. IQAC members governs this system—as per decided by management and head of the institute. The Management Members, Principal, IQAC is constituted with regular teachers, retired teachers, stake holders and ex-students. In the outset, IQAC prepares plan of educational activities and provides academic calendar in the light of university's academic calendar and M.S.P. Mandal's academic plan. Such academic calendar is provided to every department and activities of whole year regulated as per this calendar. In the month of April, every department submit annual departmental activity report to IQAC. Through IQAC which can get perspective of all academic activities of the college.

At the beginning of academic term the college publishes a prospectus through which students get information about various committees which are regulated the faculty activity. Twenty six committees are formed with their Co-ordinators and Members. These committees work under their respective Co-ordinators and ultimately Vice-Principal and Principal guidance.

The faculty is involved in decision making process through departmental committee. These committees help for active participation and for successful implementation of plan. The reports of all committees with their successful milestones are consolidated in annual report and it is projected at the time Annual Social Gathering and also published in college magazine 'Samvedan' in every year.

The Principal revierws through meetings with various stakeholders from time to time and confirms that the policy statement and action plans are implemented in fulfillment of the stated mission. The staff meetings are held at the beginning and at end of each academic term in which actions taken are discussed.
- The institutional strategic plans are carefully prepared in consultation with the stakeholders by considering the suggestions made by the NAAC Peer Team and also by the top management. The Principal modifies the action plans as and when required in consultation with Local Governing Council, IQAC and various committees so as to fulfill the mission of the institution.
- ➤ The Principal addresses the students at the beginning of the academic year about curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities to be carried during the academic year. Each and every stakeholder is free to meet the Principal for solving their complains, grievances and also to get constructive suggestions. The Principal also holds the meetings of alumni, parents and other stakeholders for the purpose of discussion various issues relating to them. Staff meeting are also held periodically in which various issues are discussed so as to ensure that mission and vision of the college are satisfying.
- ➤ Placement Cell of our college is always in touch with the industry to make a good placement of students. The requirement of industries in term of curriculum, skill development infrastructure are also taken into consideration while preparing the students for suitable placement.
- ➤ The Principal take into consideration the needs of the various programmes, courses and other activities to be carried by discussing with various stakeholders and accordingly policy and plans are formulated. Various needs found are analyzed in consultation with vice-principals and IQAC members and accordingly necessary activities are planned. The policies and plans are based on the past experience and also present academic scenario and future needs. The management provides all the necessary support for designing the plans which will fulfill the need of the stakeholders.

The Principal is committed to reinforcing the culture of excellence in respect of all the aspects of teaching learning process by creating academic ambience. The college has an independent IQAC as per the guidelines of NAAC and UGC. This cell looks after achieving excellence in all aspects of the academic programme. The Principal makes every effort for that the teaching and non-teaching staff are aware about the implementation of all the academic activities leading towards excellence. Students are also made aware about the completion of their academic programmes by studying sincerely and participating in all the curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities so as to make their all round development. Motivation is is done in the students to participate them in sports and cultural activities. For this purpose, the college provides all the necessary facilities. The students are sensitized about contemporary issues like farmers' suicide, environmental cleanliness, disaster management, gender sensitization and they are called to participate in solving such social problems by which they can acquire social life skill.

<u>Champion original change</u>: The Principal plays a vital role in formulating and implementing the policy and action plans as per the changing global scenario and current trends and requirements. The leadership of the college believes that The staff knows the need of change according to the changing environment and accepts the change. The Principal invites the suggestions from the stakeholders by formal and informal ways while formulating policies and action plans. The Principal convince the teaching and non-teaching staff about accepting and implementing the changes. So, it becomes possible to adopt and executive change with the conscious efforts by the Principal and all the stake holders.

6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time.

For the purpose achieving overall aims and objectives of the institutions, the plans and policies are framed at institutional level. With this framework, IQAC formulates the policy plans to be implemented during the academic year. The policies and plans framed by IQAC are circulated among the concerned departments. Period reviews are taken by way of feedback from the concerned departments and discussed in the meeting of IQAC. After the discussion, the status of implementation of plans and policies are known. Any lacuna in implementation in the plans and policies are found, their reasons are known by interaction with concerned members like Executive Council of M.S.P. Mandal, Planning Board, L.M.C., IQAC, parents and alumni meet periodically and give suggestions for effective implementation and improvement.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management.

The top management consists of highly educated persons such as M.L.A., Member of Parliament, Legislation, Advocates, Doctors and Industrialists. They regularly held the meetings of staff and encourage the staff and give support to various activities, programmes and workshops. They actively participate in all the activities leading to progress of college. All Heads of the Departments are given free hand to administrate their respective departments, plans and academic programmes. Classwise in-chargers and post graduate programme Director are appointed for smooth conduct of academic activities and monitor the overall performance of students through out the year. Various committees are established at college level for successful implementation of curricular and extra-curricular activities. Senior faculty work as Coordinator or Chairman of the committee while other concern faculty work as members. They are give full freedom to conduct the activities relating to their committee. The faculty members are allowed to participate and present their research papers in workshop, seminar, symposia, conferences organized at state, national and international level. The faculty members are also given freedom to work on various academic bodies like Senate, M.C., B.O.S., at university and also other government and non-government organizations. The top management is always supportive in developing academic leadership. Some of the faculty members were allowed to participate and get elected in state legislator and serve for public.

Marathada Shikshan Prasarak Mandal gives incentives to teaching and non-teaching staff by offering Excellence Award every year by judging his/her work devotion and work culture. This gives inspiration to others.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

The college groom leadership at various levels considering liking, inclination, choice and abilities of a teacher. Responsibilities are assigned upon him/her. Full freedom is given to them for the choice. They are appreciated for their leadership and innovative ideas. As per U.G.C. patterns Head of the Department are appointed as the basis seniority and eligibility. The Head is given responsibility of handling activities at department level. Faculty members are allowed to participate in faculty development programme to help and sharpen their leadership quality.

<u>Student Council</u>: The Student Council is constituted by the students on merit basis. Some students are nominated by Principal from Sports, Culture, girl student, N.S.S., N.C.C. considering their overall performance. Some of the candidates of N.C.C. are given the responsibility to work as S/U/O, J/U/O, and Sergeant as well as encourage developing leadership qualities.

N.C.C.: There are two units of N.C.C. One is for boys having capacity of 53 cadets. There is a separate girls N.C.C. unit having capacity of 53 cadets by which girls are also encouraged to develop their leadership

qualities. One of the N.C.C. cadet got the opportunity to participate Youth Exchange Programme of U.N.O.in Japan.

N.S.S.: There are three units of N.S.S. having the capacity of 300 volunteers with three separate Programme Officers for them. This serves to develop leadership qualities under N.S.S. unit. Some groups are formed like Red Ribbon Club. As student participate in N.S.S. activities irrespective of their caste, religion or geographical borders etc. and live together in Special Camps. Various qualities like leadership, awareness about national integration and social evils inculcation of life skills and work culture can develop from this unit.

Through N.S.S. one N.S.S. volunteer participated in R.D. Parade celebrated on Rajpath, Delhi and facilitated by Hon'ble President of India Mr. Pranab Mukharjee. _As well as two volunteers took part in Republic Day celebrated at Mumbai and some of the cadets participated in Disaster Management Camp held at Ahmedabad. In the national and international tournaments, students actively participated and shown their leadership qualities.

6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments/units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

Principal is the central authority in taking policy decisions but work distribution as per hierarchy and decentralized governance system which is key aspect of democratic policy is followed by the college. In all college of M.S.P. Mandal every college has its own Local Managing Council, under which the day-to-day activities of college run. Principal works as a Secretary of Local Managing Council. Three Vice-principals and seventeen Heads of various Departments, Coordinator of IQAC are the main academic leaders of the college. All the academic activities classified twenty six core committees as per NAAC criteria.

Under the supervision of Principal, Vice-principal and IQAC Coordinator the college provides autonomy to all Heads of Department, in academic planning, assignment of work, workload distribution, departmental activities, guest lectures, arranging workshops and study tour or visits. The powers are decentralized. Three Vice-principals look after the various students related matters such as S.T. concession pass, identity card, E.B.C. forms, examination forms, hostel and scholarship facilities. Each faculty has its own Vice-Principal who has a power to sanction causal leaves, duty leave, M.L., E.L. etc. In the absence of Principal, the powers is shared Vice-prinipal.

In administrative faculty, Registrar works as a Coordinator who co-operates all the non-teaching staff together. Under his supervision and with the help of Office Superintendent the non-teaching staff work smoothly. Principal takes meeting separately for non-teaching and teaching staff and solve the problems if any.

6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If 'yes', indicate the levels of participative management.

Yes.

- Staff members participating in the various activities which appreciate by the management for good work and felicitated.
- The Principal, Vice-principal and IQAC Coordinator are responsible for the academic issues where as the Registrar of the college and Office Superintendent look after the office issues.
- Principal take meeting of teaching and non-teaching staff once in each term. The periodic meetings with Vice-principal and Principal are also taken to discuss the academic and administrative matter.
- ➤ IQAC also meet periodically with the Principal related to quality enhancement polices.
- The college is administered by Marathwada Shikshan Prasarak Mandal which is the apex body which take the major decisions.
- The college has a Local Management Council that has a representative from society also who discuss the issues related to academic, administration, infrastructure and other related matters.
- ➤ IQAC has the members from teaching and non-teaching staff, management representative, society representative, student representative and external experts. Quality related issues are discussed in the IQAC meetings.
- The highlight of the activity are also communicated to the stakeholders by presenting 'annual report' in the Annual Social gathering.
- College has formed 26 different committees that take care of organizing different curricular, co-curricular and extra curricular activities.
- Special meeting are also organized by the Principal regarding the implementation of certain activities as seminar, conferences, workshops, NTS examinations, guest lectures, science exhibition, annual gathering, examinations etc. The responsibilities are allotted to the respected teaching and non-teaching staff.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment:

6.2.1 Does the Institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

Yes, institute believes that the quality is not a magic. It comes after endless and continuous efforts. So the college has developed some mechanism to know its strength and weaknesses. After taking reviews time to time the college uses to minimize lacuna and maximize strong points so that quality itself comes out.

For ensuring effective implementation of quality policy, it is reviewed through following mechanism.

- For effective teaching-learning process the Principal, Vice-principal and concerned Head of Departments observe actual teaching.
- A period review of completion of assigned syllabi is taken by concerned Head through the annual and daily teaching plans.

- ➤ The Head of the Departments give their remarks about the performance of teacher. After this the teachers submit their annual, daily teaching plan with H.O.D.s remarks before the Principal and the Principal reviews the performance of teachers in respect of completing the syllabus, participating the departmental and college activities and gives suggestions to the concerned teachers for further improvement.
- At the end of the academic year feedback reports are collected from students about teaching methods and aids used by teachers, completion of syllabi, various support services available in the college etc. These reports are analyzed by IQAC. If lacunas found necessary suggestions given to concern teacher by the Principal. These reports discussed in the meeting of Local Governing Council.

Quality and excellence in all levels for all round development of students at teaching-learning and evaluation, sports, cultural activities and extra-curricular activities. In the light of above all Heads of Department and IQAC execute the standard framed by quality policy with the help of teaching and non-teaching staff.

Teaching faculty is encouraged to use modern sophisticated techniques in teaching. They are also motivated to undertake research project, schemes and work leading to Ph.D. and M.Phil., as well as write and publish research articles in peer reviewed journals. By this way, college tries to enrich research culture. An Ideal Teacher Award given by the institute to a teacher and also in non-teaching services who show outstanding performance. The institute provides required infrastructure in terms of learners need. Each and every department is provided a computer system with internet facility for updating the knowledge of faculty. Teachers participate in various faculty development programme, workshops and seminars which help them to update their knowledge.

To make the students employable with their all round development in addition curricular activities, co-curricular and extracurricular are run by the college like participation in sports, cultural programmes, debating competition, essay writing competition, science exhibition, science talent search examination etc. Students are guided by the appropriate teacher for their well preparation. Students are easy and free access in e-library resources to become get updated for competitive examinations. Placement and Career Guidance Cell makes available information about employment opportunities and organizes campus interviews through renowned companies.


6.2.2 Does the Institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.

The title of research journal in Science is "The journal of Basic and Applied Sciences" and that of Social Science and Languages is "Abhisaran". The college has published 7 volumes of both of the journals. Renowned academicians, researchers and scientists are on the editorial board of both the journals.
- II) Teachers are given study leave as per UGC norms to complete their Ph.D. under FDP scheme.
- III) The College has established the recognized Research Centre in Marathi, Hindi.
- IV) The College has established the CFC Centre under UGC-CPE grants where highly sophisticated instruments are installed. The faculty of the college and faculty outside take the advantage of this centre.
- V) Short term research projects are assigned to the students. The visits of students and teachers are also organized to affiliated university, other university, NCL, IIM, etc. for collecting data and information required

under the students and faculty projects. Faculty is motivated to undertake major and minor research project. General information about the projects as proforma, funding agencies, research schemes, infrastructure requirement etc. is given by IQAC and Research Committee to encourage them. A good infrastructure is available with the college to perform the research. It includes well equipped Science Laboratory, fully automated library, C.F.C. Hall, ICT Room, Language Laboratory, Commerce Laboratory, Computer Laboratory etc.

- VI) The College has 10 research guides and 80 students are doing research under their able guidance.
- ➤ Different training, orientation programmes on research aspect are organized by M.S.P. Mandal and also by college. It provide necessary financial support for these programme.
- ➤ Community Engagement: The motto of the institution is "Tamsoma Jyotirgamaya" that is the Journey from Darkness to Light which is the touch bearer for all the teachers and students, which encourages them to use the power of knowledge for overcoming the Darkness of 'Agyan' by giving light of knowledge in their life. The college has taken initiatives for the benefit of the community are as follows.
- ➤ Learning about communities and social issues through field based surveys. The teachers and students make a survey of "Kakadhira" village which is 5 km away from our college. In this connection the social, economical, agricultural, health aspects are studied and reports are prepared.
- ➤ The College has participated the state launched Abhiyan called "Jagar Janivancha" where college has got first prize of one lakh rupees at district level during 2012-2013. The college has also secured second prize under the same event in the year 2013-2014.
- ➤ The rally organized by the college on "Lek Vachwa Abhiyan' in the Beed city was highly appreciated by the community. This Abhiyan helped to make awareness among the society about disparity in gender. It was an initiative taken by the college to save the girl child.
- Every year the department of dramatics organizes 'Bal Mahotava' during winter vacation to develop action skill among the children.
- ➤ The NSS unit of the college organizes special winter camps to the nearby adopted village. During these camps various activities related to maintenance of health, hygiene, environment are carried out.
- ➤ Cadets of NCC also participate in different community programmes organized by the college as Blood Donation, Tree Plantation, Traffic Control in the City, Act as Volunteers in Election Period to maintain law and order.
- ➤ For the farmers of the region the programmes like Soil and Water Testing, Organic Farming, Vermicomposting, Diagnosis of Plant Diseases and Aquarium Maintenance are run by different science department of the college.

Human Resource Management:

The success of any institution is depend upon the quality of the human resources. The management of human resources is the process consisting of recruitment, training, assigning the work, monitoring and assessing the performance of man power. Marathwada Shikshan Prasarak Mandal has their separate unit for Human Resource Management. College has 32 teaching and 79 non teaching staff. Their recruitment is based on compliance of the UGC, University and State Government rules. The institution organizes orientation programmes for the purpose of developing teaching and administrative skills among the teaching and non-teaching staff. Every year performance appraisal of teaching and non-teaching staff is done. The staff is allowed to participate and complete orientation and refresher courses for their career advancement.

Industry Interaction:

- > The industrial tours of under graduate and post graduate students are organized.
- ➤ The faculty is also deputed to different industries for training. The college had deputed four teachers to INFOSIS, Pune. This training is helped indirectly to the students and increased the campus placement of the college. Campus interviews are organized by placement cell of the college.

- Necessary information are uploaded on website of the college, displayed on the notice board and in some cases the use of what's app message and E-mail are carried out.
- The major issues are informed to the top management by the principal and he ensures the positive action about it.
- Wide Publicity is given in the News Papers about Major Events Organised in the College.
- Suggestion boxes are kept at prominent Places in the College.

- IX) Institute has little space to plants, trees; it constantly attempts to take care of the eco-system like Birds, Trees & Plants.

Energy Conservations:

Replacement of conventional lights with CFL and LED has done in the Principal's office, Auditorium, Common Facility Centre (CFC), and ICT room, Language Lab, Library, and Classrooms, Gymnasium as well as good habit introduced to students and faculties to switch off light and fans in the classrooms and laboratories after completion of activities.

➤ Water Harvesting:

Roof top rain water harvesting system is installed in the institute to recharge the bore-well; rain water is collected in syntax tank and used as substitute for distilled water in Chemistry Lab for practical purposes.

Water Management:

In the Departmental laboratories, we use small tabs. Everywhere, Press tabs are used to receive water and thus wastage of water is minimized.

Efforts for Carbon Neutrality:

Carbon reduction is achieved by avoiding refrigerator, air conditioners and carbon emitting equipment beyond the permitting scale, and point reuse of papers for rough printing is practiced.

Hazardous Waste Management's:

Standard procedures are followed by Departments for handling and disposal of hazardous waste. The college does not offers courses using chemicals end compounds with high risk of intensity and side effects. In college canteen we use glass cups and stainless steel plates for tea and snacks respectively due to these plastic and paper cups are avoided. Cigarette smoking is strictly banned in the college campus.

E-Waste Management:

An e-waste collection drop box for collecting small sized electronic waste has been kept in the main corridor of main building students and staff deposit used e-waste into it. Institute takes the help of professional agencies for proper disposal of the waste.

3. Context:



Report of the Peer Team on Institutional Accreditation of Balbhim Arts, Science and Commerce College Beed, Maharashtra (1-2 December, 2003)

Section 1: Introduction

M S P Mandal's Balbhim Arts, Science & Commerce College, Beed, was established in the year 1960 to fulfill the educational aspirations of the people in an identified backward rural district of Maharashtra. The College is a government aided institution with a campus area of 1.7 acres. It is affiliated to Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad, and is recognised by UGC under 2f (since 1983) and 12b (since 1983). The College has been receiving UGC grants regularly.

The College offers UG, PG, Ph D and P G Diploma courses, and caters to a total of 2745 students in the faculties of Arts, Social Science, Science and Commerce. A majority of these courses are under grant-in-aid and a (ew, mainly the P G courses, are 'under self-finance stream. It has 16 departments - 6 science, 4 languages, 5 social sciences and commerce. The College has a well qualified faculty of 74 of which 40 are permanent teachers and 34 are part-time faculty. There are 93 administrative, technical and non-technical employees to support the faculty. The College follows a non-semester annual University examination pattern for UG and semoster system for M Sc of Dr BRA Marathwada University. It works for a total number of 231 days of which 182 are for teaching as per the UGC norm. The support services and facilities in the College include a central library, computer laboratory, sports field, $\boldsymbol{\pi}$ gymnasium, several welfare schemes and vehicle parking shed.

The College volunteered to be assessed by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) and submitted the Self-Study Report (SSR) to NAAC. A Peer Team was constituted by NAAC to visit the institution and validate the SSR. The Peer Team consisting of Prof. Afzal Mohammed, former Vice Chancellor (V.C), Dr. B.R.



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Section: 2: Criterion-wise Analysis


Criterion 1: Curricular Aspects

At the undergraduate level, the College offers B A, B Sc and B Com degree courses with a 'triple major' system, and follows a 'cafeteria' system in offering the combinations. The student has the option to choose any combination of three subjects in a faculty, thus providing for a wide range of program options. Efforts to introduce applied and socially relevant subjects is also evident. In this connection, Agro-chemicals and Fertilizers deserve a special mention. The Peer Team observed that the students' preference is however limited to a few combinations only. The College may review those combinations that are not favoured by the students, and revamp them based on the students' feed-back on the program options and peer opinion. The College has not started in the past four decades any new courses exept for two. Physical Education & Computer Science introduced in 1993. The Peer Team is aware of the constraints of an affiliated college in these matters, yet recommends that the College may strive to introduce inter-x disciplinary and job-oriented courses like Journalism. Tourism, Hotel Management, Microbiology, Genetics, Biochemistry, Biotechnology, Computer Applications, Theatre Arts and Acturial Science.

The College offers M A (in English, Marathi, Ilindi, Political Science & Public Administration, Sociology and History), M Sc (in Chemisty and Computer Science), M Com, Ph D (in Hindi and Marathi) degree courses and a P G Diploma in Business Management. The programs are consistent with the stated goals and objectives of the institution. The College follows the syllabi prescribed by Dr BRA Marathwada University. Some of the College faculty are on various Boards of Studies of the University.

The Peer Team is of the opinion that the bun on recruitment of permanent teachers is a strain on the efforts of the College to maintain the desired academic standars at both U G and P G levels. It feels the need for an imaginative and defined policy for the College to maintain the vigour of teaching. The College may apply and seek for "autono-mous status" for achieving the above objectives.

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Criterion II: Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The College admits students in UG and PG courses on first-cum-first served basis, except in Computer Science, because the number of applicants are less than the available seats. The admission to Computer Science is by merit and to diploma in Business Management by an entrance test. The College thus has denied itself any mechanism to assess the student's merit and aptitude for a given course before or immediately after the admission.


The College conducts two test-tutorials and four internal examinations in an academic year. The Peer Team found that a number of students are absent for these tests, and the College excuses the absentees by collecting some penal fee. The College may at the beginning of the year inform the students that attendance in these tests is a pre-requisitive for the final examination. The College conducts remedial classes for slow learners, and the bright students are encouraged to prepare for competitive examinations. The College may consider starting some more certificate/diploma courses of current relevance alongside the degree courses for value addition, particularly for the benefit of fast learners. It may generate some revenue for the College as well.

The University sets the syllabus for the College. The classes are conducted regularly and the syllabus is completed in time. But the classroom attendance of the *students is rather low in a majority of subjects. The College may initiate steps to ensure maximum classroom attendance. The syllabi are unitised, and the teaching is supplemented by seminars, study tours and the use of charts, models etc. Use of OHP, *Visual Aids and internet etc is not evident. The teachers have been maintaining work dairies, which contain their individual teaching plans.

The College has appointed 34 part-time teachers on class-hourly-basis in accordance with the guidelines issued by the Government of Maharasthra. The process of selection may be made more transparent and competitive. These part-timers are lowly paid and with the result, the College is not able to get the best out of them. This situation needs to be remedied.


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


For Quality & Excellence Criterion III: Research, Consultancy and Extension There are 18 faculty members with research qualifications, and some with a few publications to their credit. The departments of Hindi and Marathi offer Ph D program, and so far 12 students (8 in Hindi and 4 in Marathi) have been awarded the degree of Ph D and 8 more are working. The College has minor research projects in the department of English, Agrochemicals, Botany and Zoology with a total outlay of Rs 1.4 lakhs. The College encourages research by granting study leave for Ph.D. and duty leave to attend seminars. Thus, research ambience exists in the College, and it may be further strengthed and spread by sensitizing the faculty in PG departments to the importance of research. The College may also make provision for some 'seed money' for research, and encorage * the faculty to apply for research projects to all funding agencies. The College does offer consultancy to the farmers of the region in an informal way more as a social service than as fund raising activity. The College engages in extension activities through its departments and NSS. In this context, 'Farmers' Guidance Centre' for soil testing and appropriate use of minerals, 'Plant desease diagnosis program', Water Table development progam and M P S C guidance centre deserve special mention. Other broad areas of extension activities of the College are community development, social work, health and hygiene awareness. medical camp, adult education & literacy, blood donation camps, AIDS awareness and environment awareness. The evidence of conducting these activities may be documented * properly and records maintained systematically. The College has invited experts from G.O. and N.G.O. for lectures, but they would do well to collaborate in specific action ** programs with them.

NAAC For Quality & Excellence Criterion IV: Infrastructure and Learning Resources The College has a rather limited campus of 1.7 acres that includes accommodation for Junior College also. The infrastructure includes a Central Librarycum-Reading Room, Lecture Rooms, a Computer Laboratory, Common Room for girls, Sports facilities, Toilet facilities, a Guestroom, Parking Shed and a Canteen. The management makes financial provisions for maintenance of its infrastructure. Various staff members participate in this work. The limited infrastructural facilities are used at different times by different departments. The laboratories are also used as classrooms. The premises are used to run the distance education program of Yeshwantrao Chayan Open University. The premises are also given to other agencies to conduct various exams, centralised assessment etc. The College would do well to shift the Junior College to some other premises to enhance the Senior College facilities. The library has 71,259 volumes. An advisory committee governs the library. The library works for 11 hours a day on all days except Sundays. During the last three months before the annual exams, the library is open for 14 hours a day. In the last two years, the College has added 1410 textbooks at the cost of Rs. 2, 14, 009/- and 512 other hooks at the cost of Rs. 1, 46, 043/-. The number of Journals/periodicals subscribed have * Library come down from 68 to 66, though the cost has gone up from Rs. 10, 731/- to Rs. 11, 184/-*Computerisation of the library services has just started. A few departments have ** kept books in the department for ready reference of the faculty. The Peer Team feels that the library accommodation and its configuration are not adequate to serve the large * library number of students in the College. The College may immediately attend to this important The College has 24 computers in the department of Computer Science, six in Commerce Department and three in the Library. The Poer Committee is happy to note that the faculty undertakes maintenance of the computers. The computer laboratory may be equipped with the internet facility that is made available to all the students.



NAAC Criterion V: Student Support and Progression Compared with the low cut-off percentage at the entry level, the college pass percentage at the exit level is satisfactory. However, there is a significant drop in the pass percentage from 2000-2001 to 2001-2002. The percentage of students appearing for the qualifying exams after the minimum period of study in 2000-01 and 2001-02 has been 78% and 76% respectively. Thus the dropout rate has been 22% and 24% respectively. The Peer Team noted with satisfaction that over the years, five students each have passed UGC-CSIR (NET), GATE and GRE examinations. One has passed UPSC exam. The College has potential to achieve more. The College publishes updated prospectus every year to guide students with regards to admissions, various prerequisites, fee-structure, financial assistance, student support services etc. Central and State Government Scholarships, BC/SC Scholarships and various prizes instituted by the College are available to students. The College has a placement officer with additional charge to counsel students about employment. He also encourages them to seek self-employment: However there are no records of any students actually finding employment through this cell. The College has just initiated a formal alumni association. The association provides medical and legal assistance as well as guest lectures. In-door games, out-door games, nature club, student magazine, debate club, subject societies, cultural programs and various competitions are the recreational/leisure time facilities and activities available to students in a small measure. These may be encouraged further. The Peer Team feels that the drop out rate of the College is rather high. The ** College would do well to go into the reasons for the same and find appropriate remedies. Keeping up the newly introduced system of to receive regular feedback from the students will belo the College to improve its educational services. The College would do well to keep a record of students' progression to further study and employment. It has kept track of a Few alumni in prominent positions. It could utilise their services much more for their educational projects. In the last two years, Just two students have received merit ** -10-



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Criterion VI: Organization and Management

The College has an internal coordinating and monitoring mechanism that consists of Lecturers, HoDs and Principal. There are various committees to carry out various responsibilities. At the management level, there is a Local Managing Committee for larger issues of finance, infrastructure, starting of new courses etc. The College has an inbuilt mechanism to check the work efficiency of the administrative staff by division of work among staff, assigning tasks and supervision by various HoDs, Registrar, Librarian and Accountant, under the overall supervision of the Principal. It follows the government guidelines with regard to recruitment of staff. It has a special committee to prepare the academic calendar. It has recently initiated the process of computerisation of the office and the library.

The College has an Employees' Credit Cooperative Society that provides various loans to the members. The Peer Team noted with appreciation the practice of the Cooperative Society to write off outstanding loans of members who die while in service. Being a grant-in-aid college, the staff members can avail of various government welfare schemes too.

The College has a discipline committee that takes up issues of discipline of staff and students. In case of a serious breach, Local Management Committee is informed.


The College runs on a large number of part-time teachers. This is fine for short time; but in the long run, it cannot function efficiently with such a large number of part-time teachers. Frank and healthy criticism and feedback from an external agency may be a great help for evaluation and improvement.

Having a set up to evaluate work efficiency of the administrative staff is good, but it is advisable to use the same to organise professional development programs for the administrative staff as well as to send them out for such programs. **

The so-called Orievance Redressal Committee is more a discipline committee than grievance redressal committee. The College would do well to have a more systematic set-up for staff and students to express their grievances and a mechanism to redress the same. It could be more gender sensitive and ensure the presence of at least

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NAAC For Quality & Excellence Criterion VII: Healthy Practices The peer team notes with appreciation the following healthy practices of the College: The College offers the subject combinations at the undergraduate level in a 'cafeteria mode' that permits maximum flexibility for program options. It offers a number of self-financed, need-based courses at both the UG and PG It prepares a detailed timetable for the entire year for academic activities and the students are informed at the time of admissions. It runs a Centre to help neighbourhood farmers for soil testing and plant disease The Credit Cooperative Society writes off loans of staff members who die while There are two teachers, one in Hindi and one in Marathi departments, who publish their creative writings and one has been-honoured as the best teacher at the state level. One of them has his books prescribed on the syllabus of more than one University. The College would do well to go into national and international collaboration with industry, NGOs and other educational institutions. Faculty memebrs could be encouraged to go in more for publications. Though it is an affiliated college, it could try and introduce some innovative evaluation methods in some of its internal exams.

The Peer Team would like to commend the college for some of the positive features of the College's approach to quality assurance and standards and at the same time point out some of its concerns to the College authorities for their consideration. The peer team would like to commend the institution for the following aspects:


- Annual calendar for academic activities

- Assistance to neighbourhood farmers with soil testing and plant disease diagnosis, a special need of this backward area of Maharashtra.


With the view to its further improvement, the peer team would like to suggest the following to the institution for its consideration:

Two research journals are published by the college, "Abhisaran" in Humanities and "Journal of Basic and Applied Sciences" in science. There are eighteen U.G.C. funded Minor Research Projects, completed/ongoing. Forty one Ph.Ds. have been produced by the faculty including thirty seven by the Department of Hindi alone. The faculty have published 68 books, 104 research articles & have attended 162 seminars in last five years.
