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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

The year 1948 was the greatest landmark in the history of Marathwada for the people began to breathe freely with their heads held high as they had valiantly shattered the shackles of slavery. It had marked the provenance of a new era, the triumph and the awakening of masses against slavery, suppression, illiteracy and ignorance. They intended to lead the masses from darkness to light, non-realization to realization, ignorance to knowledge, and avidya to vidya which eternalizes emblem of institute "*Tamso Ma Jyotirgamaya*" where main objective was to provide quality education to socially and economically backward classes & finally Marathwada Shikshan Prasarak Mandal saw an hour of dawn in Sept, 1958.

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

The institute ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well-planned and documented process. As our institute is affiliated to Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad, the college follows the curriculum and academic calendar designed by the university. Elected faculty members (BoS) from our institute, *actively participate in curriculum designing.*

Academic Calendar of the university specifies the duration of the semester, the date of commencement and the end of the semester.

With the academic calendar of university, *IQAC prepares its own academic calendar* which involves tentative dates of the academic, curricular and co-curricular activities.

In the opening meeting of each semester the Principal explains the annual academic plan and its execution.

Time table committee of the institute prepares time table of all the faculties and it is distributed to all the Head of the Departments.

After Principal meeting, as per IQAC planning, HoD of each department conducts meeting with the colleagues to prepare academic plan of the department and to distribute workload among the faculty members.

In order to conduct entire teaching learning process effectively every year IQAC provides teaching plan diary and attendance register to all the faculty members.

For proper curriculum delivery, college has *well-furnished 9 ICT rooms, Commerce Lab, Maths Lab, Language lab* and well equipped laboratories in all science departments.

The faculty members of our institute *uses ICT based modern teaching aids* along with chalk and board lecture method.

For effective teaching learning, department *organizes guest lectures, Industrial visits & study tours.*

Institute has well enriched central library with advanced resources in the form of *books, journals, e-journals and software's.*

Remedial & Bridge Course are conducted for slow learners, while advanced learners are encouraged to take part in various activities of the institute.

Institute strictly adheres to the academic calendar of our university and the academic calendar of IQAC for continuous internal evaluation (CIE).

In the beginning of each semester each faculty member informs students about *academic calendar of the institute in terms of CIE*.

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

Mechanism of internal & external assessment is transparent & robust. The college has examination committee for the smooth working of the examination system to evaluate learning levels of the students. *Staff meetings are conducted periodically to review the evaluation process* and the university circulars in this regard & displayed on the notice boards for students.

Transparency in Internal Assessment Process

University norms relating to *course-wise examination pattern are communicated to the students* through the college prospectus. Changes in schedules, patterns, methods if any, are immediately notified to the students through notice boards, student's WhatsApp group and through classroom briefing by the concerned subject teachers. Internal examination schedule is displayed on notice board in advance. **Marks**

and answer books are shown to the students in the class for self-evaluation. Students are free to interact with the teacher to resolve grievances if any, regarding the assessment.

As per the demand of course outcome, internal assessment of students is done on the basis of

1. Class assessment
2. Internal Test
3. Sessional assessment
4. Practical exam.

The same procedure is applied for project work and environmental project which are assigned to second year students of B.A, B.Com & B.Sc.

Mechanism of examination related grievances.

The college has Grievance Redressal Committee for college & university level examination related grievances. Mechanism of internal & external examination related grievances is transparent, time- bound and efficient. Internal examination related grievances are divided in to two categories.

1. College Level or Departmental Level:

All college level *exam related grievances are addressed to the examination committee* where Principal is the chairperson and University level grievances are addressed to the student facility center. *The college follows strictly the guidelines and rules issued by the affiliating university while conducting internals and semester-end examinations.* The malpractice in the examination is not tolerated. *Examinations are conducted in very transparent and time bound manner* as per the university time table. Student is not satisfied with the marks awarded even after grievances resolved by the teacher, then he may represent the same to the Head of concerned department.

1. University level:

Students are allow to apply for revaluation, recounting and challenged evaluation under

- Right to apply for verification of answer books.
- Right to apply for verification with photocopy of answer books.
- Right to challenge the evaluation of answer books.

The candidate who appeared in university examination can apply to the University for Verification of marks. The result of the verification of marks is communicated to the students. *The prescribed application form* for photocopy of answer books and verification of marks is made *available to students in online or offline mode*. If any student is not satisfied with the marks, he/she may challenge the same by applying to the university through the Principal in the prescribed format, from the date of issue of photocopy of answer book by the university. *To solve student grievances in time bound period, active student facility center is working in the college.*

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 The functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment and service rules, procedures, deployment of institutional Strategic/ perspective/development plan etc

Response:

The general body of the parent institute Marathwada Shikshan Prasarak Mandal is the apex governing body. It approves and monitors institutional policies and plans. *For smooth conduct of curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities* and administration related activities, the college has *formed 48 independent committees*. These committees call their members for periodic meetings so as to discuss and decide plan of action.

Few of these pivotal committees also suggest and recommend certain measures to be adopted for the up-gradation in the existing functioning mechanism. At the end of academic year, each committee submits its annual report and also its perspective plan/calendar for the next academic year.

College Development Committee:

The College Development Committee, formerly known as Local Management Committee, includes 17 members, constituted according to the Maharashtra University Act, 2016. It prepares annual budget and financial statements, discusses the academic progress of the college, and gives suggestions to the Management for the up gradation of teaching- learning process. This body also recommends to the Management for filling the vacancies in teaching-and nonteaching staff.

Role of Principal in College:

Principal act as the head of the institute who pays very minute attention towards administrative and academic activities.

Administration:

The college administration looks into the work related to eligibility, admission, and examination. Teaching and support staff plays a vital role in executing curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.

Role of IQAC:

The implementation of strategic plan is being monitored time to time by the Principal and IQAC through periodic reviews. The departmental Heads prepare the detailed progress report and present it in the review meetings. The benchmarking of quality standards and its monitoring, evaluation of attainment is

being carried out by the IQAC independently. The IQAC reports the findings to Principal. With thorough analysis of outcomes and based on IQAC report, the Principal recommends the corrective actions, need of further processes and deployment of resources. All these reports is being forwarded for further discussions and implementation to the CDC.

Statutory and Academically Essential Bodies:

Total 48 committees are working in the college which are mentioned in College prospectus.

Appointment and service rules:

- Assess the need for human resources from various departments and section of the college. The vacancy positions are communicated to the management by the Principal.
- The college submits subject-wise workload on the basis of students strength along with the list of existing staff to the Joint Director of Higher Education, Aurangabad.
- The Joint Director, Higher Education, Aurangabad scrutinizes the workload as per government norms and sanctions the post.
- Vacant posts are conveyed to the Special Cell of Dr.Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad.After the approval of roster of reservation of posts from the University,we obtain the NOC from the government for filling the post and allows the publication of the advertisement.
- Advertise the post in prominent Marathi and national English newspapers as well as on M.S.P. Mandal and university website and in employment news for competent candidates.

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6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

Sources of funds are as follows:

2. UGC Grants: *Our College is under 2F and 12B as per UGC Act and Permanent Affiliation of the University. So we receive assistance from UGC for the augmentation and maintenance of Infrastructure, upgrade of the Learning Resources and Research.*

The college mobilizes funds for its regular activities from various agencies. CDC, IQAC and UGC Committee is always alert in mobilizing funds and these cells have developed some systematic procedures for the optimal utilization of resources.

Our resource mobilization policy and procedures are as follows:

- The institution formed UGC Committee as per UGC guidelines given in the XII Plan.
- The UGC Committee, in close coordination with the CDC and the IQAC, monitors the mobilization of funds and makes sure that the funds are spent for the purpose for which they have been sanctioned within the plan period.
- The purchases of items/equipments are sent for approval to the management with quotation and tenders.
- Quotations and tenders are invited for all construction works and comparative statements are prepared before negotiating with contractors.
- The account section maintains receipts and payments in tally software and also in manual form.
- The Purchase Committee takes care that purchases are done properly and in accordance with the account codes and rules.
- The Library Advisory Committee takes care that the resources in library are utilized optimally.
- To ensure the optimum utilization of resources, the CDC & Principal timely issues directions.

Practice:

- Use of gymnasium at morning and evening session.
- Use of micro scale practical glasswares in Chemistry, Microbiology laboratories.
- Books, journals and newspapers are kept in reading hall for ready reading.
- Computer and Language Laboratories with latest/upgraded software ensure maximum hands on training to students.
- The central auditorium of the college is used for various curricular, co-curricular, and extra-curricular activities and for organization of seminars, conferences, and other academic discourses.
- Use of rainwater at the place of distilled water for practical purposes.

- Replacement of light consuming instrument with energy efficient instrument require less amount of energy.
- Grants recived against the salary from the government is disbursed according to the rules and regulation of the government.
- The non-salary grant is utilized as per the norms fixed by the government.
- The salary of the staff appointed for non grant courses is disbursed through the funds generated from corrsponding courses.

The college is governed by Marathwada Shikshan Prasarak Mandal whose head office is located at Aurangabad. M.S.P. Mandal regularly examines internal audit of our College. *The financial matters of senior college are mainly audited by Joint Director.The external audit is examined by auditor A.G. Nagpur.*

We provide accommodation facility one day before the exhibition. College gives eight prizes to the winner students as first, second, third and consolation prize for poster and model event. We provide certificates to all participated students in the prize distribution ceremony which organizes on the same day

Many students who take part in science exhibition participates in the various research competition fairs such as Avishkar, paper presentation activity etc. Students also know the current thrust area of research.

Best Practice II

1. Title of the Practice: Organization of State level Science talent search examination.

2. Objective of the Practice:

- To know the feedback about the position of students at the state level in basic sciences.
- To encourage the students to look beyond their textual knowledge.
- To create a relationship between theory and application of the learnt concepts.
- To slump the fear about various competitive examination in the field of basic sciences.
- To expand the horizon of the undergraduate education in application of basic science.

3. The context:

Since last eight years the college organizes the science quiz competition which is to be known as Science Talent Search Examination (STSE). This STSE is very helpful for the students to know the nature of science questions which are frequently asked in various competitive examinations. It also helps the students to take interest in basic sciences as well as to improve the knowledge and courage of students for facing various examinations such as NET, SLET, GATE, JAM etc.

4. The Practice:

Every year college organizes STSE to celebrate the Science Day. The examination is being organized in the month of January. The detail information of examination which includes date of examination, time, and prizes is sent to all colleges in the month of October or November. The college appoints two faculty members of our college as a co-coordinator and convener for the smooth conduct of examination. The coordinator of STSE appoints faculty member of respective college as a local coordinator to communicate the students about registration. At the time of examination, one of the faculty member work as an examiner to conduct the examination at respective center. The result of STSE is declared in the second week of February and prize distribution ceremony is being organized on 28th February every year.

5. Evidence of Success:

Involvement of students is notable. Many students who take part in STSE cleared SLET/NET/GATE examinations. Students participated in this examination got success in PG entrance examination. This exam also creates interest among the students about the basic science.
